REPORTS OF THE PRESS ASSOCIATION. Entered according to act of Congress, in the year 1861, by J. S. Treasurer, in the Clerk's Office of the District Court of the Confederate States of the Northern District of Georgia.

From Richmond. RICHMOND, July 20. An official dispatch received at the War Department states that a force of the enemy crossed the Shenandoah at Snicker's on the 18th. At 3 p. m. they were attacked and driven across the river in confusion.

From Petersburg. PETERSBURG, July 20. No change in the situation, and no indication of immediate hostilities on the part of Grant. Weather warm and sultry. A heavy rain fell yesterday, refreshing everything.

From Georgia. ATLANTA, July 18. The army and the public were surprised this morning with the announcement of a change of commanders. Gen. Johnston has been relieved and Gen. Hood has taken command.

HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF TENNESSEE, July 17, 1864. In obedience to the orders of the War Department, I turn over to Gen. Hood, the command of the army of the Department of Tennessee.

One of these rumors was that a battery of ours not far below City Point, on the North side of James river had fired into and sunk two Yankee transports heavily laden with troops, and caused five others to take the back track seriously crippled. This report has "come up straight," and we believe it to be true.

ANOTHER RUMOR WAS CURRENT WHICH MUST BE TAKEN AT ITS PAR VALUE, or at whatever discount the reader pleases. It was to the effect that Gen. Grant was killed by a shell on Friday. The story goes that on that day he had ascended an eminence therefore safe to witness the shelling of Petersburg, and that while engaged in that pleasant and human occupation, a shell, or a fragment of a shell terminated his mortal existence, and that this was done by an unexpected battery planted by us just in time to kill Grant. This is the report. We give it as we got it for better or worse. - Petersburg Register.
