RICHMOND, July 20. An official dispatch received at the War Department states that a force of the enemy crossed the Shenandoah at Snicker's on the 18. At 3 p. m. they were attacked and driven across the river in confu-S10D.

Our loss stated at between 200 and 300; that of the enemy much greater.

From Petersburg.

PETERSBURG, July 20. No change in the situation, and no indication of immediate hostilities on the part of Grant.

Weather warm and sultry. A heavy rain felli yesterday, refreshing everything.

The report of Grant's death is contradicted by demishing and cannonading.

ATLANTA, July 18 The army and the public were surprised this morn-Hood has taken command.

The following is Gen. Johnston's farewell address to his troops :

HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF TENNESSEE, / July 17, 1864.

I turn over to Gen. Hood, the command of the army 10 or 14 days ago. of the Department of Teonessee. I cannot leave - Petersburg Register. this noble army without expressing my-admiration of the high military qualities it has displayed so conspicuously in every 'soldiery virtue, eudurance of toil, obedience to orders, and brilliant course -The enemy has never attacked, but to be severely repulsed and punished. You, soldiers, have never argued but from your courage, and never counted vour fears. No longer your commander, I will still watch your career and will rejoice in your victories, To one and all I offer assurances of my friendship. bid you an affectionate farwell. (Signed) JOS. E JOHNSTON.

MR. 
