#### From Georgia

ATLANTA, July 22. About two o'clock this evening the enemy attacked our left, under Stewart, with great vigor, and were received with a galling fire, from both artillery and infantry, which caused them to falter. When the order was given to charge, our troops left their breastworks and charged with great gallantry, driving the enemy from two lines of their entrenchments and inflicting immense slaughter, capturing a large number of prisoners and twenty pieces of artillery.

Among their killed are, Gen. McPherson, shot through the heart, Brig. Gen. Giles A. Smith and Yankee Gen. Hood.

Gen. Graham lost a leg. Gen. Hardee having passed and routed the enemy's flank is now in their rear doing great execution. Fighting still continues:

#### Later from Georgia.

ATLANTA, July 23. General Wheeler last evening attacked the enemy's left in the neighborhood of Decatur, driving them, capturing five hundred wagons, with supplies, and a large number of prisoners. He is still pursuing them. There was very little fighting after dark yesterday. Two thousand prisoners, including seventy five commissioned officers, twentyfive pieces of artillery, and seven stand of colors have been brought in. Loss on either side not yet known. Our loss was severe in officers. Comparatively quiet reigns this morning, some little skirs mishing on our left.

RICHMOND, July 23. The following dispatch was received at noon to-

ATLANTA, July 22, 10 p. m.

Secretary of War : The army shifted its position, fronting on Peach Tree Creek, last night and Stewart's and Cheatham's corps formed in line of battle around the city .-Hardee's corps made a night march and attacked the enemy's extreme left to day about one o'clock, Hardee drove him from his works, capturing sixteen cannon and two stands of colors. Cheatham attacked the enemy and captured six pieces of artila lery. During the engagement we captured about two thousand prisoners. Wheeler's cavalry routed the enemy in the neighborhood of Decatur to-day, capturing his camp. Our loss not yet fully ascertained. Maj. Gen. Walker was killed, and Brig. Gens Smith, Gist and Mercer wounded. Prison. ers report M'Pherson killed. Our troops fought with great gallantry.

SHERMAN'S COMMISSARIAT-WHAT A SIN-GLE CORPS CONSUMES.

A correspondent of the Cincinnati Commercial, writing from Big Shanty, says :

The Commissary Department of the army is very complete, and now that the railway is open to Big Shanty, the army is supplied with full rations. Col. Remick, Commissary of the 4th Corps, inforns me that six hundred head of cattle are killed per week in supplying the corps with fresh beef. The cattle are obtained chiefly in the Chicago markets and sent forward to the front. From Nashville they are driven forward at the rate of about eight miles per day, halting to graze at every point along the route where there is good grass. On reaching the front they are very fat and ready for the knife,

#### MONOCACY.

The battle at Monocacy bridge turns out a more serious affair than we supposed. We learn from an officer who has just arrived here, and who was wounded there, that we captured some six hundred or seven hundred prisoners. The loss of the enemy in killed and wounded he would not venture to state: they were utterly routed. Our loss was some seven hundred killed and wounded. Our entire army was on the ground, but Gordon's division alone was engaged. The forces of the enemy consisted of Wallace's troops (the 8th army corps) and Rickett's di-

vision of the 6th coms. We captured in the expedition large numbers of horses and cattle, which were safely brought off. Two corps from Grant's army had arrived in Maryland. Charlottesville (Va.) Chronicle.
