## From Georgia.

LAGRANGE, Oct. 11. Inclink movement of Gen, Hood upon Atlanta has so far been completely successful. The railroad, from Bg Shanty to Kingston, has been utterly destroved, even the cuts filled up, and all the garrison along that distance captured. On last Wednesday, the Fourth Division of Stewart's Corps made an attack upon Allatona, which failed, the whole Corps inbacquently went to his assistance, when the town was carried by as-ault, and four thousand prisoners taken together with an immense quantity of the mastrial of war, Our army was on the Kingston and Rome Rails ad, at last accounts. Gen. Beauregard is with Gen. Hood. Slocomb's 20th army Corps now holds Atlanta; the rest of Sherman's army has gone up the read. There is no cavalry at Atlanta whatever. Gen. Iverson captured East Point the other day, taking fifty wagons in good condition, and the wrecks of a great many more. Executive Department North Carolina,

AN ACT IN RELATION TO THE MILITIA AND A GUARD FOR HOME DEFENCE.

State of North Carolina and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same. That the exemptions from service in the Militia of the State shall be for the same causes, and to the same extent, and no further, than are proseribed in the acts of Congress of the Confederate States, providing for the enrolment of men for the public defence, and granting exemptions from the same, commonly called the conscription and exemption acts.

810. 2. Be it further enacted, That it shall be the duty of the Governor to cause to be enrolled as a Guard for Rome Defence, all white male persons not already enrolled in the service of the Confederate. States, between the ages of eighteen and fifty years, resident in this State, including foreigners not naturalised, who have been resident in the State for thirty days before such enrolment, excepting persons filling the offices of Governor, Judges of the Supreme and Saperior Courts of Law and Equity, the members of the General Assembly, and the officers of the several departments of the Government, 'members of Congress and the civil and military officers of the Confederate government within this State, ministers of the gospel of the several denominations in the State charged with the duties of such ministry, the bigh sheriff, and clerks of the several courts of record, and the public registers in the several counties, and such other persons as the Governor, for pecial reasons, may deem proper subjects of exemption.

SEC. 3. Be it further enacted, That all persons above the age of fifty, who may volunteer for service in said Guard in Home Defence, and shall he accepted by a Captain of a company for the same, shall be deemed to belong thereto, and shall be held to service therein, either generally, or for any special duty or expedition, as the commanding officers of regiments or companies, according to the nature of the particular service in question may determine.

SEC. 4. Be it further enacted, That the Governor shall cause all persons enrolled in pursuance of the two prece. Buncombe.

ding sections of this act to be formed into companies, with ty to elect the commissioned officers of such companies, and thence into battalions or regiments, brigades and Watson, Craven, Clerk; Wesley Jones, Wake, Marshall. divisions, according to his discretion ; and he shall appoint the field officers of such battalions, regiments, brigades and divisions, and shall issue commissions in due form to all the officers aforesaid.

SEC. 5. Be it further enacted, That members of the society of friends, commonly called Quakers, may be exempt. ed from the provisions of this act by paying the sum of one hundred dollars, according to an ordinance of the Convention of this State in that behalf, ratified the 12th day of May, 1862: Provided. That when any such Quaker shall have paid or had levied of his property five hundred dollars, under the acts of Congress called the conscription law aforesaid, he shall not be required to pay any sum of money for his exemption under this act.

SEC. 6. Be it further enacted, That the said Guards for Home Defence may be called out for service by the Governor in the defence of the State against invasion and to suppress insurrections, either by regiments, battalions or companies en masse, or by draft or volunteers from the same, as he in his discretion may direct; shall be under his command through the officers appointed as herein provided; shall serve only within the limits of this State, and in tours of duty to be prescribed by the Governor, not ex. ceeding three months at one term. They, or so many of them as may be at, one time called into service, may be organized into infantry, artillery or cavalry as he may direct, and the infantry and artillery may be mounted if he shall so determine, the men furnishing their own horses, and accoutrements, and arms, when approved by the Governor, on such terms as he shall prescribe.

SEC. 7. Be it further enacted, That the Governor may furnish to said troops the arms, accoutrements and ammunition of the State when called as aforesaid into active service; and shall prescribe rules for their action, to prevent the waste, destruction or loss of the same.

SEC. 8. Be it further enacted, That all laws and clauses of laws coming within the meaning and purview of this act, be and they are hereby repealed.

SEC 9. Be in further enacted, That the commissions of officers of the militia, ealled into service by this act, are suspended only during the period of such service. SEC. 10. Be it further enacted, That this act shall be in force from the date of its ratification. [Rafified the 7th. day of July, 1863.]

AN ACT TO AMEND AN ACT IN RELATION TO THE MILITIA. AND A GUARD FOR HOME DEFENCE. SECTION. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, and it is hereby enacted by the au thority of the same, That neither the Governor of this State, nor the officers acting under an act ratified on the for drill or muster the persons enrolled under said act oftener than once a month in company drill, or oftener than twice a year in battalion drill; which battalion drills shall take the place of the company drills for the month in which they are appointed, unless called into actual service to repel invasion or suppress insurrection or to execute the laws

of the State. SEC. 2. Be it further enacted, That the Governor shall have the power to use the Guards for Home Defence, for the purpose of arresting conscripts and deserters : Provided, They shall not be ordered upon this duty beyond the limits of the counties in which they reside, or the counties

SEC. 3. Be it further enacted, That in addition to the exemptions contained in that act to which this is an amendment, there shall be exempt County Commissioners, appointed under an act entitled "An act for the relief of wives and families of soldiers in the army," regular millers, blacksmiths who have established shops, necessary operatives in factories and foundries, the Attorney Constal peratives in factories and foundries, the Attorney General, Solicitors of the several circuits and counties, physicians of five years' practice, contractors with the State or Confederate governments, one editor to each newspaper and the necessary compositors, mail carriers, professors in colleges and teachers in academies. Provided, That this exception which they may be temporarily residing. Toss emption shall only apply to the drills epscified in this bill | who fall to do this, will not be withheld from conscription.

The fines shall be adjudged by regimental and company court-martial, and judgments are to be entered up, and the fines collected in the same mode, and ir. accordance with the provisions of the militis law of North Carolina, passed at the second extra session of the General Assembly, 1861.

SEC. 5. Be it further enacted, That the Surgeon General, by and with the advice and consent of the Gorornor, may appoint surgical boards, not exceeding three, composed of two physicians each, who shall declars by their certificates those persons who shall be exempt from service, under the act to which this is an amendment, on account of mental or physical disability, and that they shall receive the pay of their rank and traveling expenses, to be determined by

the Adjutant General. SEC. 6. Be it further enacted, That the Guard for flome Defence, should they be called into service by the Governor, shall receive the same pay, rations and allowances as soldiers in the Confederate States' service, and shall be sabject to the rules and articles of war of the Confederate States. SEC. 7. Be it further enacted, That when the presente of public danger shall not prevent the observance of such a rule, the said Guards for Home Defence shall not be called into service en masse, but by drafts of a number of men from each convenient company, so as to make up the azgregate force required.

8Ec. 8. Be it further enacted, That this act shall be in

force and take effect from and after its ratification. [Ratified the 14th day of December, 1868.]
