Seymour has issued a long proclamation urging efforts by all to discountenance of strife and disorder at the coming election, and directs sheriffs and other officers whose duty it is to keep the peace to take care that every voter shall have tree ballot, and see that no military or other organized force shall be allowed in the vicinity of places where elections are held with a view of menacing intimidating voters. RICHMOND, Nov. 6. The New York papers of the 4th have been received. There was much excitement at Ogsdenburg, New York, regarding an expected rebel raid from Canada. Business was suspended and the citizens were preparing for defence. A large number armed men suspected to be rebels are on islands in the St. Lawrence river above and below Ogdensburg. A suspicious steamer having on board about 50 men passed along the river close to shore in the afternoon and reported that the Tallahassee entered Delaware break water and fired and destroyed several vessels at anchor there, and afterwards landed at Lewis, Delaware, and robbed the people of a large amount of property. Four vessels were near in pur-suit of the Tallahassee.

If three hundred thousand signatures have been obtained in England and Ireland, an equal number might, with the utmost ease, have been collected in France. The French Government, regarding this civil war as a great disaster for America, and a great calamity for a certain class of manufacturers, has continued officiously to promote ideas of reconciliation. On the other hand, the strictest neutrality was, and is, observed on all questions connected with the building of vessels or furnishing munitions of war. The Imperial Government of course only knows the Government of Washington : but it is no secret that, as in England, the Southern envoys have occasionally communicated with official personages in Paris.

I. The following acts of the General Assembly of North Carolina are published for the information of all concerned; AN ACT IN RELATION TO THE MILITIA. AND A GUARD FOR HOME DEFENCE.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same. That the exemptions from service in the Militia of the State shall be for the same causes, and to the same extent, and no further, than are prescribed in the acts of Congress of the Confederate States, providing for the enrolment of men for the public defence, Major Henry A Dowd, Edgecombe, do
Major James H. Foote, Asst. Adjt. Gen., (Roll of Honor.)

Major William A Graham, Jr., Ass't Adjt. General. and granting exemptions from the same, commonly called Sec. 2 Be it further enacted. That it shall be the duty

of the dievernor to cause to be enrolled as a Guard for Home Defence, all white male fersons not already enrolled in the service of the Confederate, States, between the ages Lieut. Isaac W. Garrett, Edgecombe, Asst. Quartermaster. of eighteen and fifty years, resident in this State, including foreigners not naturalized, who have been resident in the State for thirty days before such enrolment, excepting per-Lieut. Geo. W. day of July, 1863.] AN ACT TO AMEND AN ACT IN RELATION TO THE MILITIA, AND A GUARD FOR HOME DEFENCE. Section. 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That neither the Governor of this State, nor the officers acting under an act ratified on the 7th day of July, 1863, entitled "An act in relation to the Militia, and a Guard for Home Defence," shall call out for drill or muster the persons enrolled under said act of-

tener than once a month in company drift, or oftener than

twice a year in battalion drill; which battalion drills shall take the place of the company drills for the month in which

they are appointed, unless called into actual service to re-

pel invasion or suppress insurrection or to execute the laws SEC. 2. Be it further enacted, That the Governor shall have the power to use the Guards for Home Defence, for the purpose of arresting conscripts and deserters : Provided. They shall not be ordered upon this duty beyond the limits of the counties in which they reside, or the counties

adjacent thereto. Sec. 3. Be it further enacted, That in addition to the exemptions contained in that act to which this is an amendment, there shall be exempt County Commissioners, ap-Nelll Mck McNelli pointed under an act entitled "An act for the relief of wives and families of soldiers in the army," regular millers, blacksmiths who have established shops, necessary operatives in factories and foundries, the Attorney General, Solicitors of the several circuits and counties, physicians of five years' practice, contractors with the State or Confederate governments, one editor to each newspaper and the necessary compositors, mail carriers, professors in colleges and teachers in academies. Provided, That this exemption shall only apply to the drills specified in this bill and not to service when the Guard for Home Detence is

called into the field. Sec. 4. Be it further enucled, That for failure to attend at battalion or regimental seed, each field offi er shall forfeit and pay one hundred dollars; each captain and other officers who shall fail to muster and drill their companies the times appointed, shall terfeit and pay for each failure fifty dollars; and if a non-commissioned officer or private shall fail to attend any drill, he shall forfeit and pay not less than five, nor more than twenty five dollars : Provided, That every absentee shall be allowed until the next muster to make his excess. The fines shall be adjudged by regimental and company court-martiel, and judgments are to be entered up, and the fines collected in the same mode, and it, accordance with the provisions of the militia law of North Carolina, passed at the second extra session of the General Assembly, 1841.

SEC. 5. Be it further enacted, That the Surgeon General, by and with the advicement consent of the Governor, may appoint surgical boards, not exceeding three, composed of two physicians each, who shall declare by their certificates those persons who shall be exempt from service, under the net to which this is an amendment, on account of mental or physical disability, and that they shall receive the pay of their rank and traveling expenses, to be determined by the A fjutant General.

Ske. 6 Be it further enacted. That the Guard for Home Defence, should they be called into service by the Governor, shall receive the same pay, rations and allowances as soldiers in the Confederate States' service, and shall be sale, ject to the rules and articles of war of the Confederate States. Sec. 7. Be it further exacted, That when the pressure of public danger shall not prevent the observance of such a rule, the said Guards for Home Defence shall not be called into service en masse, but by drafts of a number of men from each convenient company, so as to make up the ag-

SEC. 8 Be it further enacted, That this act shall be in force and take effect from and after its ratification. [Ratified the 14th day of December, 1868.] II. The Company Drills required by the 1st section of the last named act, will take place on the second Saturday in the months of January, February, March, May, June, Apgust, September, November and December, and the July, Battation Drills on the second Saturday in the months of
