REPORT OF THE SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY.

[CONTINUED] This amount applied annually would redeem the notes outstanding in four or five years. The credit due to this estimate may be inferred from the following summary of the crop of the Confederate States before the war, taken from the United States census of 1864.

[The Secretary here gives an elaborate table of the cotton, wheat and corn raised, estimated in value as follows:-cotton 50 cents per pound, wheat \$1 per bushel, corn \$2 per bushel; which shows an aggregate in the thirteen States of 5,186,646 bales of cotton, weighing 2,074,258,000 pounds, valued at \$1,037,129,000. Of wheat, 42,992,391 bushels, valued at \$171,952,164. Of corn, 417,600,304; valued at \$835,200,608. Total valuation of the three products-\$2,044,282,772.

Of these amounts North Carolina's quota is put down at 145,514 bales of cotton, weighing 58,205,600 pounds, and valued at \$29,102,800. Wheat, 4,748,706 bushels, valued at \$18,974,824. Corn, 30,078,454 bushels valued at \$60,156,898. Total aggregate of the value of the three articles of produce in North Carolina \$108,234,722.

The leading details of the plan of measure to re-assure the public of the safety of the currency, and the redemption of it in full, will consist of a ratio in which the selected staples should be combined, and of the provision necessary to equalize the value of the postponed and preceding instalments. The combination of the staples are recommended in this report is 1 of wheat, 4-9 of corn, 4-9 of cotton. The scheme recommended in another place, for the purpose of harmonizing the value of the successive instalments, is the substitution of certificates, bearing interest for one dollar in specie, the cost holders, in commutation of the tax, or to purchase the fifties. After the most careful investigation I am satisfied that the measure may be successfully reduced to practice.

Under the operation of this system a sure appreciation of the currency may be expected. All will discern the advantage to arise from the acquisition of treasury notes at present prices, and even foreign capital may be expected to absorb a part, for, at the rate of ten dollars for one dollar in specie, the cost of ten dollars would be reduced to five cents per pound. Confidence may be expected to return for those who dread repudiation, and those who would regard the return to specie payments with equal alarm, would be encouraged and assured. In imparting increased value and security to the treasury notes, greater reliance in the value of the funded debt would be inspired, for the expenditures would be reduced and the accumulation of debt retarded.

The currency debt being provided for, the total remainder, to-wit, the funded debt, would be already stated, \$788,340,090

And if to this sum be added the amount of bonds to be sold before the 1st of January, which may be estimated at about 40,000,000 The total sum of interest-bearing debt on the 1st of January, 1865, will be 778,340,090

The value of real and of personal property in the Confederate States in 1860 according to the United States census, taken at special value, was \$5,202,166,107

Notwithstanding the waste and desolation of the war, and the amount of property in the enemy's lines, the subjects of taxation under the act of 17th February, 1864, according to the returns made to the commissioners by the assessors, under the act of 18th August, 1861, is as follows, viz: Property employed in agriculture: \$2,900,758,777

Specie value, \$2,900,758,777 Currency valued at \$5 for \$1, 14,508,793,890 Other property: Specie value, 1,450,879,379 Currency valued at \$7 for \$1, 10,152,655,658 Specie value, \$4,851,188,165

There is an element of our national wealth, taken singly, that exhibits, in a striking view, the amplitude of our resources to meet our wants. I refer to the great staple of cotton. The net proceeds of one bale exported and sold in England at the present price, is about two hundred dollars in gold; and at the rate of ten dollars in currency for one dollar in gold, this is equal to two thousand dollars; and to will suffice for the quarter's tax, and the amount collected in any one quarter will be restored to the circulation before another becomes payable, it is apparent that the resources of the country are ample to meet the proposed increase of taxes.

It may be objected that the several measures combined will unduly reduce the circulation, and expose the country to the evils of a declining and insufficient currency. The reply to this objection is, that the evils predicted are, to some extent, inseparable from the reduction of the currency and the improvement of its value. Any measures that are necessary in effecting the desired reform must, of necessity be followed by the trials that attend upon such a transition. If Congress does not interpose, and by some such measures as I have ventured to recommend, restore the currency, gradually, judiciously, and by means of voluntary action, it will assuredly rectify itself by some violent and disastrous convulsion.

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 17. I. One editor and one printer to each newspaper, and one druggist to each apothecary store, are exempt from duty in the Militia or Home Defence, except when the country is invaded by the enemy, provided there is not that number of persons not liable to duty in the Guard for Home Defence, employed in said newspaper establishment or drug-store.

II. The attention of all officers of the Militia and Guard for Home Defence is called to the proclamation of His Excellency, the Governor, dated in this city on the 24th inst., granting pardon to deserters who may voluntarily surrender themselves within the next thirty days. Persons so surrendering will be sent to the nearest conscript camp, and will be furnished by the officer to whom the surrender is made with an attested statement setting forth the fact, specifying the time and place of surrender.

III. Attention is also called to the II paragraph of General Order No. 1, dated January 15, 1864. The more effectually to carry out said paragraph, commanders of regiments or companies of the Guard for Home Defence will make to this office on the last day of each month a written report of the operations of their commands during the month, stating the number of days they have been out, the number of deserters apprehended, and the names of those who have voluntarily surrendered, and the names of each officer as may have failed to perform their duty, and in what particular.

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 19. THE PRACTICE WHICH HAS PREVAILED TO some extent among officers of the Militia and Guard for Home Defence, of granting temporary furloughs to deserters, who have been apprehended or who have voluntarily surrendered themselves, must be discontinued. They are strictly forbidden to grant furloughs to any persons not members of their company.

GENERAL ORDERS, No. 21. I. The senior officer of each regiment of N. C. Militia will forward to this office without delay a list of the names of the commissioned officers of their respective regiments, within the limits of their proper district. Also a list of all vacancies now existing and the cause and date of such vacancies. In future they will promptly report to this office the cause and date of every vacancy which may hereafter occur in their respective regiments.

II. Militia officers who have been compelled by the advance of the enemy to leave their respective districts, will report for duty to the commanding officer of the regimental district in which they may be temporarily residing. Inclusive, at 65% From 1st to last day of April, inclusive, at 55% From 1st to last day of May, inclusive, at 45% From 1st to last day of June, inclusive, at 35% From 1st to last day of July, inclusive, at 25% From 1st to last day of Aug., inclusive, at 15% From 1st to last day of Sept., inclusive, at 5% Swept away by monthly tax. Oct. inclusive at 0% JANUARY, 1865, are taxed 100 per cent., and destroying every vestige of value.

FOR THE INFORMATION OF ALL CONCERNED I. It is declared that the Guard for Home Defence consists of all able-bodied males of legal age, exempt from law from service in the Confederate Army, between the ages of eighteen and fifty years, residents in the State, including foreigners not naturalized who have taken the oath of citizenship in the State, before enrollment, excepting such persons as are exempt by the laws of the State, by orders of the Governor, or on account of physical disability.

II. Company commanders will each on the next drill day make an examination of his company in accordance with the above declaration and transmit the same to his Battalion commander to be sent by him without delay to this office. Upon the receipt of these company rolls, Battalion commanders having arms and accoutrements the property of the State in their possession or the possession of their men, after returning a gun and accoutrements for each man of his company will send the remainder to this city to Maj. T. D. Hogg, Ordnance Officer.

III. The second paragraph of General Order No. 9, making it the duty of all Militia and Home Guard officers to arrest any officer or agent who in making impressments fails to comply with the impressment laws in every particular is hereby so modified as to make it the duty of all such officers to call out their commands to assist in arresting any person against whom a civil warrant is directed upon application of any Judge or Justice of the Peace stating that said officer is not able to make the arrest without aid from the militia; he being thus made the duty of all Militia and Home Guard officers to assist the civil authority in suppressing illegal impressments. It is hereby forbidden officers of either class to become impressment agents, and those holding such agencies must resign the same to the agency or commission in the State service. Commanders of Regiments and Battalions will see that this latter clause is complied with.
