MESSAGE OF THE GOVERNOR OF VIR-GINIA-THE EXEMPTION OF STATE OFFICERS.

One of the first duties of the Legislature, will be the consideration of the measures "to bring into the field all the ablebedied men who are not necessary to the State Government" On this subject he says:

It is utterly impossible for me to understand the logic which exempts State officers who are not necesary for the State Government; and yet it is the fact that the judges are undertaking to turn loose from the grasp of military authority. men without any duty to perform, upon the ground that they are officers provided by the constitution and the laws. There are some forty or fifty counties of Virginia within the enemy's lines most of them under a regular government of the enemy. The State officers therein have been-where lover of course, -expelled from office and are refugees. Most of them have acquired new homes and formed new social and business relations, and may not return to their will never return even with peace; and it may be a question, if they should do so, whether they would have a right to resume their offices. Under the law and constitution, the counties will average about sixty officers furnishing within the enemy's lines a number equal to about two thousand, constituting a force sufficient it may be. to turn the tide of a great battle. Yet accord. ing to the decisions of some of the judges, these officers would be exempt from military duty, although without civil duties to perform, and with a great probability that they will have some during the continuance of the war.

The doctrine contended for may lead to the most fatal results. If all the officers designated in the constitution, and in the laws made in pursnance thereof, are to be exempted because they are State officers -if all the justices of the peace. who, by the bye, were never exempted until the 1st of October 1862, having from the revolution to that period been required to perform military daty-if all sheriffs and clerks, and their deputies -all commissioners of the revenue-all survey. o-s and commonwealth's attorneys-all consta- brown. bles end overseers to the poor -- all county agents for supplying soldiers' famili s-all salt agents, commercial agents, etc-all employees of banks, eities, towns, etc., are to be exempt indiscriminately, and without reference to their necessity, then indeed, in the language of the decision so frequently quoted, "the spectacle might be presented of a nation subjugated and destroyed at a time when it had within its limits citizens amply sufficient to defend it against all the assaults of its enemies, but whose services could not be commanded because, forsooth, the Government had contracted with them that they should not be required to serve in the army." So far, in this State the number of exempts is comparatively small; but in other states we are told it is widely different. At this, time a powerf army of the enemy is sweeping over the State of Georgia, in which under the doctrine contended for, there is now an army of exempts-exempts because officers and employees of the State government.

At this time the pressure of the service inspires a very common desire to escape from it; and the remedy of habeas corpus, designed for the extraordinary acts of official tyranny or individual acts of oppression is daily resorted to, to extricate the citizen from the holy duty of defending the couns try. Lawyers of every degre hie to the feast thus spread before them, and judges, in chambers and in court, feel constrained to apply the principles of the writ to those but little better than moral deserters from the standard of their country; and at a time, too, when she is struggling in a death grapple with her gigantic fee.

I respectfully suggest for your consideration the passage of a law which will diminish the number of these officers and restrict their selection to persons of an age usually beyond the period of military service. I propose the passage of a law diminishing the number of districts in the several counties and confining the election of magistrates to persons over forty five years of age.

PUTTING NEGROES INTO THE FIELD. Has the time arrived when this issue is fairly before us? Is it, indeed, liberty; and independence, or subjugation, which is presented to us? Are we able, beyond a question, to wage successful war against a power three times our own in numbers, with all Europe from which to recruit; and who unhe itatingly put arms in the hands of our own negroes for our des truction? I will not say that under the Providence of God, we may not be able to triumph; but I do say that we should not, from any mawkish sensibility, refuse any means within our reach which will tend to unable us to work out our deliverance. For my part standing before God and my country, I do known. not hesitate to say I would arm such portion of our able bodied slave population as may be necessary and put them in the field, so as to have them ready for the spring campaign, even if it resulted in the freedom of those thus organized. Will I not employ them to fight the negro force of the enemy; aye, the Yankees themselves, who already boast that they have two hundred thousand of our slaves n arms against us? Can we hesitate—can we doubt

-when the question is, whether our enemy use our slaves against us, or we use them against him-when the question may be between liberty and independence on one band, or our subjugation and utter ruin on the other?

I am aware that a clamer has been raised against the policy of putting the negroes into the army by good and loyal men, because they say, "the end is not yet"—that our army of citizen soldiers is still competent to make good our defence. No one would advocate the policy of thus appropriating our slaves: except as a matter of urgent necessity; but as public opini on is widely divided on this subject, does not common prudence require us to fear those opposed to this extreme measure may be mistaken? Suppose it should so turn out, how deep would be their responsibility to the country, to freedom and independence everywhere! I know it is the opinion of the high military authorities that the time has come when we should call our slaves to our assistance; and I hold it to be clearly the duty of every citizen, however much he may doubt the wisdom and necessity of the policy, to co-operate in strengthening, by every means, our armies. I repeat, I know th's policy is looked to with anxiety by some of the ablest military men of the age, who believe it is of the highest importance that it should be adopted without delay. counties until this war shall terminate. Upon the receipt of these company rolls, Battalion commanders having arms and accourtements the property of the State in their possession or the possession of their men, after retaining a gun and accourtements for each man of his command will send the remainder to this city to Maj. T.D. Hogg, Ordnance

Officer.

III. The second paragraph of General Orders No. 9, making it the duty of all Militia and Home Guard Officers to agrest any officer or agent who in making impressments fails to comply with the impressing laws in every particular is hereby so modified as to make it the duty of all such officers to call out their commands to assist in arresting any person against whom a civil warrant is directed upon application of any Judge or Justice of the Peace stating that the civil officer is not able to make the arrest without aid from the militia. It being thus made the duty of all Miletia and Home Guard Officers to assist the civil anthority in suppressing illegal impressments, it is hereby forbidden officers of either class to become impressing agents, and those holding such agencies must resign either the agency or commission in the State service. Commanders of Regiments and Battalions will see that this latter clause is compiled with.

THE UNDERSIGNED HAS BEEN APPOINTED A COM-I neissioner to investigate, collect and pay over to the par-ties entitled therete, all claims for bounty arrestages of pay and allowances, due to the representatives of deceased officers and soldiers from this State.

The parties entitled are : first, the widow of the deceased If any, if there be no widow then, secondly, the child or chill dren, if there be such, if there be neither, widow or children then, thirdly, the father, if there be fielther widow, child chikiren or father then, fourthly, the mother of the deceased. and in default of all of these then, fiftaly, the executor or ad ministrator of the deceased.

The claimant or claimants must furnish his, her or their affldsvit, and that of one disinterested witness as to the relationship, and in all cases, where the claimant is not the widow, the affidavit most negative the existence of a claimants of a higher order. The Justice of the Peace, before whom the affidavit is subscribed must certify to the credibilits of the witness, and Clerk of the County Court must certify, under the seal of the Court, that he is a Justice of the Peace.

If the cisemafit or claimant be a child or citie ren of the deceased; and he, she or they be minors, the claim must be propounded by his, her or their guardian, and the fact of his being guardian must be certified to, under seal of the County

When the claims is made by an executor or administrator, the fact of the executorship or seal by the County Court All of these papers should be sent in duplicate. Any person circetly interested will be furnished, upon application to me, with a proper form of these papers in fall; copy of which, for the greater convenience of parties, will-be forwarded as soon as may be practicable to each County Court

This commission is intended to facilitate the collection of these claims, and save the claimants all expense Parties interested may materially aid me in the invertigation of their claims, if at the time of fire . rding their paper to me, they will inform me of the date of the death of the deceased, where he died, was killed, whether or not they or any one for them, have received the personal effects which deceased had with him at the time of his death, and whether or not the deceased (if a non commissioned officer or private.) had ever received the State's bounty.

It is very desirable that all claims should be forwarded at as early as may be practic ble. In all cases, give the claimants,
