REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE On the Investigation of tertain matters in the Treasurer's Report for the Year 1863.

The select committee to which was referred the following preamble and resolution, to-wit: Public Treasurer for the year 1863, that as follows, the class were presented for payment. At what time they fell due, I am unable to state, not having been able to find any entry in the office showing the date They are registered bonds, and I find in this office a partment. book in which the holders of these bonds gave receipts for the semi-annual interest, from which it appears that the total amount of them was \$370,000. The books show the payment of \$317,000, leaving vapaid \$53,000." And whereas, it also appears in the Public Treasurer's Report of May 17th, 1864, as follows, to-wit: "The Atlantic and N. C. Railroad Company owed the State on account of the loan to that company under the act of 1856, chap. 71, some \$400,000. This act provides that the loan was to be made only on consideration that the road should set aside its receipts over and above annual expenses as a sinking fund to pay the debt and interest; and on the further conditions of giving a mostgage on the effects of the company, conditioned to save the State harmless against loss of both principal and interest, which mortgage I have not been able to find. The following are all the payments which have been made on this debt, to-wit: November 1863, one hundred and forty-eight thousand dollars; December, one hundred thousand dollars." And whereas, it is due alike to the credit of the State and the character of the late Public Treasurer, that an investigation of these matters should be made, and all the facts con.

nected therewith ascertained, therefore, Resolved, That a select committee, consisting of three members, be appointed to examine the matters referred to in the foregoing preamble, and report the result of such examination to the Senate," have performed that duty and respectfully report:

That before proceeding to the required investigation they notified the late Treasurer, through their chairman, of the time and place of their first meeting, and asked him if he desired to be present; to which he replied that he did not, nor did he desire that either of his clerks should attend. Upon examination of the books of the Treasury Department they find that the 53,000 dollars of bonds referred to by the Public Treasurer in his report for the year 1863, and which he states he does not find mentioned in the reports of his predecessor, are the balance of a class of registered bonds or certificates authorized to be issued by an act of the General Assembly. passed at the session of 1850-'51, and form a part of the \$270,000 mentioned in the Treasurer's report above referred to. By an act passed at the session of 1848-'9 the Public Treasury was authorized and directed to issue certificates of debt in proper form to the amount of \$200,000, to pay certain liabilities of the State then outstanding, which sum proving insufficient, another act was passed at the succeeding session of 1850-'51, authorizing a similar issue of \$200,000 more for the same purpose. These certificates of debt were to run ten years, and to bear interest at the rate of six per cent. yer annum. They were to be signed by the public Treasurer and countersigned by the Comptroller, and were transferable only on the books of the Treasury Department. At the time of the issue of these certificates under the act of 1848 '9 the late Maj. Charles L. Hinton, was Public Treasurer, and it appears from the books of the Treasury Department that the whole sum was issued by him from time to time, as the wants of the Treasury required, all of which were promptly paid on their arriving at maturity. Of the \$200,000 authorized by the act of 1850 '51 only \$170,000 were issued, that sum being sufficient to pay the liabilities provided for. This latter amount was issued by the late Treasurer, D. W. Courts, Esq., and according to his report were sold at a premium. Of this last mentioned sum \$117,000 has been paid, leaving the foregoing bulance of \$53,000 still duc

and unpaid, as stated in the Treasurer's report.

The committee examined with great care the entries

on the books of the Treasury, and find that the whole sum realized from the sale of the \$370,000 of certificates or bonds as aforesaid, was regularly entered and charged in the books, the first 200,000 against Ex-Treasurer Hinton and the \$170,000 against the late Treasurer, D. W. Courts. They also find that each bond as issued, was regularly entered in a books prepared for that purpose, showing the date of its reensboro', N. C., Dec. 26, 1864. issue, the number of the bond, purchaser's name, and amount. Upon referring to the late Treasurer's printed reports, we find that in the biennial reports to the General Assembly for the year 1858 and 1860, there is a full statement in each of the indebtadness of the State, exhibiting the bonds in question as well as others. In the reports for the years 1852, 1856 and 1862, there is no general statement showing the indebtedness of the State, but there is an estimate in each of these years of the amount of money supposed to be required for support of the government and the payment of interest on the outstanding debt ) for the succeeding two years, in which estimate is included a sum necessary to pay the interest on the registered bonds or certificates aforesaid. During the session of 1858, there was a special call by reso lution of the Senate on the Public Treasurer, for a statement of the State cebt, and in response to that call, the late Treasurer furnished the required statement, in which the bonds or certificates issued under the acts before refered to, amounting to the afore said sum of \$270,000, are fully set forth. The only statement furnished by the late Treasurer exhibiting the indebtedness of the State, in which these certificates or bonds do not appear in one or the other of the before-mentioned forms, is a report made by that officer to the board of claims, at the request of the chairman of that board, in the month of October, 1862. In this report these bonds or certificates are omitted. For what reason your committee have been unable to ascertain. They were informed however by the late chief clerk of the Treasury Department who made out the statement, that the bonds or certificates in question were omitted from the statement because they were overdue. This in the opinion of your committee instead of being a reason for their omission, was rather a reason why they should have been included. The statement of the State's indebtedness here referred to, your committee were informed by the present Treasurer was the one he examined when preparing his annual report, and in reference to which he made the following statement: "The first class of bonds mentioned in this exhibit, amounting to \$53,000, I do not find mentoned in the report of my predecessor."

In reference to the second branch of the inquiry with which your committee is charged, as to the doubt implied whether or not the condition of the "act to provide for the completion of the Atlantic and North Carolina Railroad" had been complied with prior to the delivery to the company of the \$400,000 of State bonds mentioned in said act, your committee find that according to the second section of the act, the Railroad Company was required to "execute and deliver to the Governor of this State a mortgage on the entire road and its warehouses, stations and rolling stock, conditioned to save the State harmless against loss of both principal and interest to Stindard office,
