Spruill, Esq., requested to act as Secretary. On motion, a committee was appointed. emsisting of A Mickle, Dr. Mallett, Dr. J. B. Jones. John Watson and Rev. Mr. Wilson, to report resolutions for the action of the meeting. The commitsee retired, and on returning, presented, through Mickle, chairman, the following resolutions.

"WHEREAS, Recent events have made it clear that the general desire for peace cannot be grati-fied, except upon terms that are both ruinous and dishonorable; Therefore.

Resolved. That for the sake of our country, and woking the help of Almighty God, we hereby call upon all men to lay aside former differences and unite in a manly effort for the common de-

Revolved, That in this erisis it is the duty of every citizen to contribute all in his power to strengthen and sustain the cause of the Confederate States, especially by aiding and encouraging our soldiers in the field, and by making provision for the support of their families at home.

Resolved, That the thanks of the country are year. due to our soldiers for the heroic gallantry with which they have resisted the invaders, and for the determination they now express. not to falter till Independence is secured.

Resolved, That believing our cause just, we ledge ourselves to do and suffer everything which m.v be necessary, or useful in maintaining and de-Judge Pearson was requested to address the

meeting, which he proceeded to do. | Near the close of his remarks, Saml. F. Phillips, Esqr., came in. and was called on to address the meeting. He said that he had not been advised that a

meeting was proposed to be held; expressed some opposition to the preamble to the resolutions, and suggested that more time be given.

A motion was made that the resolutions be adopt. ed and published-pending which, the meeting adjourned until to morrow evening at & o'clock.

SATURDAY EVENING, 8 O'CLOCK.

The chairman called the meeting to order. Mr. Phillips addressed the meeting at some length, c'riefly in opposition to the preamble to the reso'utions, and proposed to amend by striking out the preamble, and inserting the following preamble and resolution, viz:

WHEREAS, Recent events renders it probable that the maintainance of slavery is no longer a seriod question in the present contest, and whereas, these events, offer to us as a new phase in the the war, the solemn alternative of reconstruction, or a'ming the negro, which propositions demand Raleigh on the first day of every month. great consideration by North Carolina, in sover-

eign assembly; wherefore, Resolved, that a convention of the people of North Carolina, ought to be held at the earliest

Judge Pearson addressed the meeting. A division of the question was called for, and the nestion was on striking out the preamble. Pening this question, the Hon. D. L Swain, presented the meeting the fellowing resolution as express-

ing his opinion. . Resolved, That we suppose no village in North Carolina has, in proportion to its resources and population, contributed more largely in blood and reasure, to the maintainance of the gigantic war in which, during four years; we have been struggling to preserve our constitutional rights; that in the future as in the past, in humble but hopeful reliance on the blessing of Almighty God, we will relax no effort to drive back the invader, maintain our liberty and secure an honorable and permanent adjustment of our difficulties with the Uni-

The resolution was received with expressions of applause and gratification by the meeting.

The question now recurred on striking out the preamble to the resolution. The chairman, on a count, reported that 62 voted for striking out, and 81 against it. The count was objected to, as the chairman had counted boys. He was urged to have a recount and exclude all under 21 years old. He said that excluding those he had counted under 21 years of age, would not change the result; but he had counted none who were not subject to conscription, and he contended that in a meeting of this kind, those who were to compose the army had a right to vote, and he decided the vote to be sgaint striking out whereupon a portion of the meeting with drew.
