THE Trustees of Edenton Academy have great pleasure in announcing to the friends and patrons of the Institution, that their efforts to obtain an additional Teacher have, at length, been crowned with success. They feel it incumbent on them, therefore, to state, that the upper classes of the School, consisting of those scholars who are engaged in the study of the Languages and the different branches of the Mathematics, will hereafter claim the whole and undivided attention of Mr. AVERY, a gentleman whose conduct and general deportment have already proved him well qualified for the duties of the station; and in whose character and talents the most unlimited confidence may be placed. Students under the direction of Mr. Avery who shall not, at any time, have charge of more than 30, will have to pay 7 dollars and 50 cents per quarter instead of 6 dollars: In the other departments the price will be as heretofore.
