EDWARDS THE SPY.

The following is a copy of the deposition of Picard respecting Edwards, read in the House of Commons, by

erman Wood. now Edwards : I first saw him before the first Smithfield meeting. Previous to the last time of my seeing Edwards, I went to the Scotch Arms, in Round-court in the Strand, and saw Adams and Edwards there. They both taked about destroying the Ministers, and invited me to go to a me eting, and Adams gave me a grenade, and Edwards give me a mal pike. I told Whatman of the circumstance-ne advised me to have nothing to do with the business. Adams and Edwards called at my lodge ings the day before the Caro-street business, but I had left."
