[For The Confederate,] A Brief History of the 7th Regiment, N. C. T., from its Organization to the 1st Oc.ober. 1863.

The Seventh Regiment of North Carolina Troops was organized on the day of August, 1891, at Camp Mason, near Graham, Alamance county, North Carolina, as one of the infantry regiments of the original ten thousand State troops, with Reuben P. Campbell, of Iredell county, N. C., Colonel, Edward Graham Haywood, of Wake county, N. C. as Lieutenant Colonel, and Edward D. Hall, of New Hanover county, N. C., as Major.

The regiment left Camp Mason on the 28th of August, 1861, and arrived at Newbern, N. C., on the morning of the 29 h, at and about which point it remained, until the 9th of September, at which time it was ordered to Carolina City, and remained there, or on Bogue Banks, or at Shepherdsville, until the 6th of-March, 1852, when it was again ordered to Newbern.

On the 13th, it was amarched to the fortifications near Newbern, and the artillery from the gunboats opened on us that evening; on the regiment being under the immediate command of Lieut. Col. Haywood-Colonet Campbell having been placed in command of several regiments, one of which was the sev-

During this action seven companies of the regiment, by order of Lieut. Col. Haywood, altered their position, and drove the enemy out of our breast works, at the point of the bayonet; after they had entered them at some point on our right, left exposed by the early flight of part of our troops. - Col. Campbell, Lieut. Col. Haywood, and Major Hall, were all present, participating in this charge-and Lient, Gen. Holmes, (then Major Gen.) sent a complimentary letter to the commanding officer of the 7th regiment shortly after, landing the conduct of his regiment in the affair at Newbern, and refusing to let the exceptional cases of miscon fuct on the part of some of the men come before a court-martial, on account of the gallantry of the whole regiment. This letter forms part of an order for releasing the accused men from confinement. now recorded in the regimental order book, Special Order, No. 21, April 23d, 1862. Atter this fight at Newbern, in which 4,000, or less, of our men engaged 13,000 of the enemy's troops-assisted by a fleet of gunboats. and with reserves of 7,000 more-and held them at bay with very heavy loss, for more than four hours of incessant fighting-the seventh regiment retreated with the rest of our troops to Kinston, N. C., which point they reached on Sunday, the 16th of March,

For some time before the battle of Newbern, this regiment was in Gent L. O'B Branca's brigade, and was commanded by. han in that battle, and continued in his brigade and under his command notil his death is the battle of Sharpsburg, on the 17th of Sep-! tember, 1862. F. and A. commanded respectively by Captains MacRae, Turner and Knox, were detached to clear the road up to Mechanicsville, and crossed the bridge a little in advance of the rest of the seventh. Shortly after crossing this detachment encountered a squadron of yankee cavalry, and put them to flight, capturing their guidon. The most active part of the skirmishing was done by Captain Turner, and the flag was first seized by Captain M c-Rae-the same being the first Lag captured in the fights around Richmond-taken before the rest of the troops had crossed the Chickahominy. These facts, are, for the mont part, authenticated by General Order, No. 6-Headquarters. 4th Brigade, Light Division, July 29th, 1862 Lieut, Col. Haywo d's command. supported by Col. Campbell, with the rest of the seventh-and at one time assisted by Co. B, commanded by Captain R. S. Youngwere actively engaged in skirmishing, and feeling the way for the march of the rest of thet roops, until pretty late in the afternoon of the 26th. In the afternoon of the 27th, we encountered the enemy at Cold Hurbor, and after a bloody battle, defeated him. The seventh regiment was sent in advance by Gen. Branch -it suffered verely. Col. Campbell was killed bearing his flag forward; 1st Lieut. Dancan C. Haywood, seized it next and shared the same fate; seven men in all wero shot down in their efforts to carry it forward. Just at night, when the regsment was reduced to a handful, the battered flag and shattered staff were brought out of the conflict by Corporal (now Orderly Sergeant) L zarus Peary, Co. C, of Brunswick county, N. C., and the flag was transmitted to the Chief Executive of N. C. by Lieut. Col. Harwood, provious to be Coonel from that date; Major Hill to be Lieut, Colonel, and Captain R. S. Young to

On the 29th of June, 1862, we again encountered the valles at Fozzier's farm, where we again had a bloody contest, and on the 30th the regiment was under heavy fire at Malvern Hill, but were not actively engaged. We pursued the enemy on the 1st of July, and marched to the neighboorhood of Harrison's landing on James river, where we remained until the 4ta of July, when we remyoved to within three miles of Richmond, where we remained natil the 28th of the same month. For a more particular and reliable account of the part taken by the seventh regiment in the seven days around Richmond, reference is made to the official report of Lieut, Cd. FOUR PER CENT ON FEDERATES. - As some uncertainty and even misapprehension exists as to the transferability of the four-per cent. certificates now being issued under the recent Currency Act, the following statement, which the Sentinel makes, upon full information from the Treasury Department, and by its desire, will be acceptable to the public.

The four per cent, certificate of deposit will be received in payment of the taxes of the person to whom they are issued, or of any assigner. The certificates are assignable in the form usual with cortificates of stock,-We would advise holders to take the usual buliness cou sit of making an assignment before a magistrate. diag the form to be found | Daily board do on the back of all Confederate registered Transient, per day? bonds, but leaving a blank for the name of the assignee. The name of any holder can be

inserted to suit one stons. We are further informed that when a certificate of dep sit presented by a tax payer shall exceed the amount of his taxes, the tax cillectors will be authorized to give him a new certificate for the excess. For example, if a citizen's tax be seven bundred dollars, and he give in a certificate of deposit for one thousand dollars, he will receive a new certificate for three hundred dollars. Thus, a certificate for a large amount may serve the successive uses of several tax payers. Fractional parts of a hundred dollars, however, the tax payer will be required to pay in money, as no bond containing such fraction will be issued from the Trea-

The denominations of the bonds to be issued in redemption of the certificates of deposit now being given, will be six, and no more -viz; one hundred, two hundred, five hundred, one thousand, three thousand and five thousand.
