Two days after the battle.

Editors Confederate:—Before this reaches you, your columns will have announced the Naval Engagement on the Albemarle Sound, on Thursday, the 5th inst., to be known in history, I suppose, as the battle of Sandy Point.

The steam ram "Albemarle," commanded by Captain Cook, moved down the Sound from the Roanoke river between two and three o'clock, p. m., on Thursday, accompanied by the light transport, "Cotton Plant," and the gunboat "Bombshell," captured at Plymouth.

With one accord, the household, black and white, from chamber and kitchen and field, ran to a shaded knoll overlooking the water, whence we had a good view of a scene both magnificent and fearful.

ance and the lateness of the hour prevented distinct vision. The shore now bears innumerable evidences of the damage done to the enemy's splinters, and large fragments of oak sheathing, copper plated, portions of window-sash with bits of glass and putty still adhering, pieces of panelling and other ornamental work from cabins or saloons, several fine launches, two of which were badly shot to pieces; oars, gun-rammers, window-shutters, cabin doors, hatchments, fragments of fine furniture, and even of little articles of toilet and table furniture, with hundreds of other little proofs, of the destruction wrought by the gun, rather than the guns, of the Ram.

The battle ended on our side with the capture of the Bombshell, and the retreat of the Ram with damage so trifling as to seem almost insignificant, when we consider the great superiority of the enemy in speed and numbers. Hence, no doubt, the Herald will blazon a "great NAVAL VICTORY" in its most exaggerated capitals, and the falsehood will be loudly re-echoed by the whole Northern press.

each man had better come prepared with a blanket
and three days rations.

If a man fails to report promptly to the Enroll-
ing Officer at the appointed times will not only be
considered as evidence that the party has no
claim to exemption, but will also subject him to
the penalties of a deserter.

It is absolutely necessary that Militia Officers, to as-
sist the enrolling officer in the discharge of his
duties and for other purposes. Those who have

AN APPEAL TO THE PEOPLE OF THE

CONFEDERATE STATES.
The Directors of the Young Men's
Christian Association of Richmond, respect-
fully, but earnestly, submit to the benevolent and
patriotic throughout the Confederate States, an
appeal in behalf of the Soldiers' Families in
this city. Since the commencement of the war,
Richmond has been a refuge for those who
have been driven from their homes by
our ruthless enemies. Thousands of helpless
women and children are crowded into a
county of Virginia alone, but from nearly every
State of the Confederacy, have sought an asylum
in our midst. Our citizens have been appealed to
in numerous instances to give the sick and
wounded soldiers, to furnish shoes and clothing
for soldiers in the field and hospital, and to afford
food and shelter for their suffering families, and
not a few have responded to the call of duty.
The supplies of provisions in this city at this
time are so reduced, and the difficulties of ob-
taining them so great, that the funds contributed for the
relief of the poor can accomplish but little in pur-
chasing the necessities of life.

A written report from the Clothing Bureau,
of this city, states that there are more than three
thousand families in this city who are seeking em-
ployment from the Government in vain, and that those
who obtain work are not fully employed. The
wages received for their work will not enable
them to procure a sufficient quantity of the
plainest food for themselves and children. With-
out assistance, then, from the city and country
generally, many instances of actual starvation
must have occurred. Our Government supplies to
the most liberal appropriations for the purchase of
supplies, both for gratuitous distribution and for
sale at cost; but the agents employed for the pur-
pose have been unable to procure a sufficient quan-
tity of provisions required.

Under these circumstances, we feel that it is
our duty to appeal to our fellow-citizens through-
out the Confederate States, to forward, without
delay, contributions of money and supplies to the
Army Committee of this Association. Since the
commencement of the war this Committee has
labored zealously and faithfully for the temporal
and spiritual welfare of our soldiers and their fam-
ilies, and the success of our glorious cause. Let
those soldiers not be discouraged now, upon the
eve of our severest, and, as we trust, our last
and most glorious campaign, for want of the good-
ness and sympathy and support of their friends at
home.

Shipments made to Roger Martin, Superintendent
of the Army, will be promptly attended to. And
in accordance with a special agreement made
with the Superintendent of the Southern Express
Company, all express charges will be paid by
them at Richmond.
