SHORES OF ALBEMARLE SOUND,] Two days after the Battle.

Editors Confederate :- Before this reaches you, your columns will have announced the Naval Engagement on the Albemarle Sound, on Thursday, the 5th inst., to be known in history, I suppose, as the "Battle of Sandy Point." But it may be interesting to your readers to have an account from an eye-witmess on shore. As my home is immediately on the bound, and but two miles from the Peint, I had from a rising ground as satisfactory a view, without a glass, as could be desired. A nearer view would have enabled us to judge better of the effects of the shots, but we were near enough for safety .--As at was, our party were momentarily exnecting a shell or two, and several window panes in the house were broken by the vioent concussion.

The steam ram "Albemarle," commanded by Captain Cook, moved down the Sound from the Roanoke river between two and three o'clock, p. m., on Thursday, accompaied by the little transport, "Cotton Plant," and the gunboat "Bombshell," captured at Plymouth. A squadron of five United States gunboats, which had been lying a most respectful distance from the mouth of Roanoke since the capture of Plymouth, as a fleet of bservation, fled like sheep before the monitor, out of range and without any show of resistance. As our liftle fleet sailed securely down the bosom of the broad Albemarie, the "Cotton Plant" was observed to turn and retire with quickened speed towards the mouth of Reanoke. She, meanwhile, stood still, her brave little consort slightly in the advance, and as the forward vessel came within range, saluted her with one of her deep-monthed guns. Very promptly the Yankees responded with one of theirs, and the fight be un. With one accord, the household, black and white, from chamber and kitchen and field, ran to a shaded knoll overhanging the water. whence we had a good view of 'a scene bath magnificent and fearful. ' Never, surely, did these peaceful shores resound with such reverberating thunders- never were these placid waters so plowed by hostile prows and destructive missiles. The enemy came on in single file and at full speed. The foremost vessel ran straight up to the Ram, as if she would run her down, veered off a little, passed ahead and gave her a broadside; then crossed her bows, returned and delivered another broadside, and passed on out of range. The second and third steamers moved and fired in like manner. The first re peated these evolutions, and was again fol-Wallz continued for some time, the Ram receiving the tremendous fire apparently with the most stoical coolness and indifference, and delivering her fatal bolts deliberately and accurately, whilst the enemy fired rapidly and very wildly. The rear boat, avoiding closer quarters with the Ram, f and a nearer and less formidable antago ust in the Bombshell, which, undismayed, maintained a brisk fight with nearly the whole squadron for some minutes; till surrounded and cut off from her consort and protector, she raised a white flag and dropped out of action-a captive, mute and motionless, and awaiting the orders of her captors. During this time the guns of the Ram had been doing execution. From the hold of the largest steamer issued a thick column of smoke, which increased as the cloud of powder smoke was flown away. She ceased firing, and all hands seemed to engage in subduing the flames. After half an hour's work this was accomplished, and again she mingled in the dreadful fray. The battle now raged more fiercely than ever. The Ram, to our surprise, began to move slowly toward Plymouth, firing regularly, but at longer intervals, whilst the enemy pressed her more hotly. The larger steamers kept up their solemn waltz, varied with occasional digressions; the smaller boats moved a little nearer and the whole nine vomited forth their shell and solid shot at irregular but frequent intervals. Sometimes the whole number, the Ram include !, | were completely shrouded in thick white Gower, Wm ke, which lay upon the blue, rippling, glancing waters like a thunder cloud in a clear summer sky, whilst nought else was seen at the heree conflict behind it but columns of showy spray, rising successively in long lines as the balls richoted across the water. Then the soft South wind would lift the currain just in time to disclose the red flashes of new broadsides from the enemy, or the jet of lurid fire which preceded one of the sonorous, metalic Jalem, W voices of the iron monster. Now one of the enemy's largest vessels hag withdrawn from the fight and steams rather slowly behind Sandy Point-where she still lies at this moment, badly crippled-the Ram, meanwhile, steadily pursuing her course toward Roanoke river, and firing leisurely as she moves-the fire of the enemy somewhat slackens, and only the two remaining large vessels continue the pursuit. Presently they stop and wait for two smaller boats coming up, and while the four are lying in a group, as if in consultation, I distinctly hear the dull crash of a ball from the Ram as it buries itself in one of the wooden hulks. As if maddened by the blow, they start more eagerly after the retreating monitor, who now nears the river's mouth. Away in the distance the battle once more rages furiously, and long after we ceased to distinguish the vessels, the flashes of flame were visible till the gathering gloom of evening put the first, was fired by the Albemarle as she entered the Roanoke. So ended the first and memorable engagement on Albemarle sound. The next day came atelligence direct from Plymouth, that early in the engagement one of the Albemarle's two guns was disabled, in consequence of which she returned; but that notwithstanding, she had subsequently crippled one and sunk two of the enemy's vessels ! We had seen one of the steamers withdraw apparently crippled, but the sinking of the others must have occurred the coming August election. further up the Sound, where the increasing dis- ap 21-73-d4t &w 4t



tance and the lateness of the hour prevented distinct vision. The shore now bears innumerable evidences of the damage done to the enemy :-- splinters, and large fragments of oak sheathing, copper fastened, portions of window-sash with bits of glass and putty still adhering, pieces of pannelling and other ornamental work from cabins or saloons, saveral fine launches, two of which are badly shot to pieces; oars, gun-rammers, window-shutters, cabin doors, hatchments, fragments of fine furniture, and even of little articles of toilet and table furniture, with hundreds of other little proofs, of the destruction wrought by the gun, rather than the guns, of the Ram,

The battle ended on our side with the cap ture of the Bombshell, and the retreat of the Ram with damage so trifling as to seem almost miraculous, when we consider the great superigrity of the enemy in speed and numbers. Hence, no doubt, the Herald will blazon a

"great NAVAL VICTORY" in its most examgerated eapitals, and the falsehood will be loud. ly re-echoed by the whole Northern press. But I have told what I have seen, as well as heard, and as further evidence of this "victory," the enemy's boats, somewhat reduced in numbers, have lain ever since the fight in one position; at the respectful distance of eight or ten miles from the mouth of Ronoake-content, it would seem, with the glory (?) they have acquired, instead of going on to annihilate the monster, as they doubtless thought to have done.

This would appear to be one of the most astonishing naval battles on record. At the lowest calculation, fifty guns were bearing st once upon the Ram, many of them throwing 100 pound shot and shell, as the numerous amunition boxes constanly floating ashore testify ; and some of them probably of still greater calibre. Nine gunboats engaged the Ram at once; and that she should have sustained for loss of fifteen of her outer plates, the loss of her flagstaff and the perforation of her smokestack, whilst not a leak was sprung nor a man killed-this sounds utterly incredible. But there are the facts. It is not difficult to determine on which side rests the honor of victory. H. A. S. 1.0

The Directors of the Young Men's Christian Association of Richmond, respect. fully, but e unestly, submit to the benevolent and the patriotic throughout the Confederate States, an appeal in behalf of the Soldiers' Families in this city. Since the commencement of the war. Richmond has been a refuge for those who have been driven from their homes by our ruthless enemies. Thousands of helpless women and child.en, not from the devastated counties of Virginia alone, but from nearly every State of the Confederacy, have sought an asvium in our midst. Our citizens have been appealed to in numberless instances to relieve the sick and wounded soldiers, to furnish shoes and clothing for soldiers in the field and hospital, and to afford food and shelter for their suffering families, and nobly have they, in the great majority of in-stances, responded to every appeal. The supplies of provisions in this city at this time are so reduced, and the difficulties of ob-taining others by ordinary means so numerous and great, that the funds contributed for the relief of the poor can accomplish but little in pur-In a writton port from the Clothing Bureau, it appears that there are more than three thou-sand females in this city who are seeking employment from the Government in vain, and that those who obtain work are not fully employed. The wages received for their work will not enable these poor women to procure a sufficiency of the plainest food for themselves and children. Without assistance, then, from the city and country generally, many instances of actual starvation must have occurred. Our City Council has made most liberal appropriations for the purchase of supplies, both for gratuitous distribution and for sale at cost ; but the agents employed for the purpose have not been able to procure the quantity of provisions required. Under these circumstances, we feel that it is our duty to appeal to our feilow-citizens throughout the Confederate States, to forward, without delay, contributions of money and supplies to the army Committee of this association. Since the commencemnt of the war this Committee has labored zealously and faithfully for the temporal and spiritual welfare of our soldiers and their families, and the success of our glorious cause. Let those soldiers not be discouraged now, upon the eve of our severest, and, as we trust, our last and most glorious campaign, for want of the generous sympathy and support of their friends at Shipments made to Roger Martin, Superintend-ent, or Win. P. Munford, Chairman of the Army Committee, will be promptly attended to. SEC. 6. That to pay the expenses of the Government not otherwise provided for, the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby authorized to issue six per cent. bonds to an amount not exceeding five hundred millions of dollars, the principal and interest whereof shall be free from taxation ; and for the payment of the interest thereon the entire net receipts of any export duty hereafter laid on any cotton, tobacco and naval stores, which shall be exported from the Confederate States, and the net proceeds of the import duties laid, or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay annually the interest, are hereby specially pledged : Provided that the duties now laid upon imports, and hereby pledged, shall hereafter be paid in specie, or in sterling exchange, or in coupons of raid bonds. SEC S. The bonds sutherized by the Sth section of this act, may cither be registered or coupon bonds, as the parties taking them may elect, and they my be exchanged for each other under such regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe; they shall be for one hundred dollars, or some multiple of ne hundred dollars, and shall, together with the coupons thereto attached, be in such form and of such authentication as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe ; the interest shall be payable half yearly, on the first of January and July in each year; and the principal shall be payable not less than thirty years from the date.
