Public Meeting in Hertford County.

In a meeting of the citizens of Hertford county, in the Court House, on Monday, the 23rd March, Wm. Pringle was called to the chair, and Geo. W. Beverly was appointed secretary.

On motion, a committee of five was appointed to draft resolutions for the meeting; the chairman appointed on the committee, Jesse J. Yeates, Daniel Valentine, Hon. W. N. H. Smith, Jr., T. J. Wheeler and Col. J. M. Wynn, who retired after a short absence made the following report:

Resolved, That we declare our preference for him, and disregarding former divisions of sentiment, will give him our votes in the next election; and believing that unanimity should be as far as practicable manifested in making the selection as due to the just influence of North Carolina and her proud history in the past, we do earnestly invite his general support by her people.

The meeting was addressed by Col. J. W. Hinton in the absence of the committee, in a speech of great eloquence and power, reviewing the history of the present war and paying to Gov. Vance an eulogy that made our people proud to think we had so noble and patriotic a hero as Governor of the Old North State.

After the reading of the resolutions, speeches were made by Hon. W. N. H. Smith and Jesse J. Yeates and of motion the resolutions were unanimously adopted. It being the week of the Superior Court, a large number of the people of the county were present, and the enthusiastic and undivided sentiment of the meeting was for our cause and Governor Vance.

On motion, a committee of five were appointed to extend to Gov. Vance an invitation to visit the county and address the citizens at the time and place he may select. The chairman appointed on that committee, Jesse J. Yeates, Dr. R. H. Shield, W. L. Daniel, R. G. Cowper and Col. Starkey Sharp. On motion the proceedings of the meeting were ordered to be published in the Fayetteville Observer, Raleigh Confederate and all other papers in the State favorable to the revolution of Gov. Vance.

SPECIAL ORDER, No. 24. ALL WHITE MALE PERSONS IN THE counties of Beaufort and Hyde, between the ages of 18 and 45 years, are hereby ordered to attend at the Enrolling Office, in Beaufort County, N. C., on the following days, for Enrollment: 14th Regiment, N. C. Militia, Beaufort county, May 26th, 28th, 29th, 14th Regiment N. C. Militia, Hyde county, May 28th, 30th, 31st.

All citizens of Beaufort and Hyde counties between the specified ages, except such as have been enrolled in other parts of the State, are absolutely required to report at the above-mentioned Enrolling Office, on the first day appointed for the enrollment of the citizens of their county, and as it is probable the enrollment will continue for several days, each man had better come prepared with a blanket and three days rations.

III. A failure to report promptly to the Enrolling Office at the appointed times will not be considered as evidence that the party has no claim to exemption, but will also subject him to the treatment of a deserter.

IV. It is absolutely necessary that Militia Officers attend the enrollment of their Regiments, to assist the Enrolling Officer in the discharge of his duties and for other purposes. Those who have sought refuge in other parts of the State are requested to be present at the appointed times also.

PARTIES interested are hereby notified, that the Board of Officers appointed "to examine into and report on the claims for the amount of claims" for "losses of slaves, which have been impressed by Confederate authorities, or under State laws, for the use of the Confederate government, and while engaged in laboring on public defenses, have escaped to the enemy, or died, or contracted diseases which have, after their discharge resulted fatally," is organized at Richmond, and has commenced its regular sessions.

Evidence of ownership, of the fact of impressment, of the age, soundness and value of the slave at the time of impressment; and of the loss of the slave, whether by escape or death, with the circumstances attending the same, must accompany the claims.

AN APPEAL TO THE PEOPLE OF THE CONFEDERATE STATES.

The Directors of the Young Men's Christian Association of Richmond, respectfully submit to the benevolent and patriotic throughout the Confederate States, an appeal in behalf of the Soldiers' Families in this city. Since the commencement of the war, Richmond has been a refuge for those who have been driven from their homes by our ruthless enemies. Thousands of helpless women and children, not from the devastated counties of Virginia alone, but from nearly every State of the Confederacy, have sought an asylum in our midst.

Our citizens have been appealed to in innumerable instances to relieve the sick and wounded soldiers, to furnish shoes and clothing for soldiers in the field and hospital, and to afford food and shelter for their suffering families, and nobly have they, in the great majority of instances, responded to every appeal.

It is a written report from the Clothing Bureau, it appears that there are more than three thousand families in this city who are seeking employment from the Government in vain, and that those who obtain work are not fully employed. The wages received for their work will not enable these poor women to procure any clothing for their families. The principal food for themselves and children, without assistance, then, from the city and county generally, many instances of actual starvation must have occurred.

Our City Council has made most liberal appropriations for the purchase of supplies, both for gratuitous distribution and for sale at cost; but the agents employed for the purpose have not been able to procure the quantity of provisions required for this object.

Under these circumstances, we feel that it is our duty to appeal to our fellow-citizens throughout the Confederate States, to forward, without delay, contributions of money and supplies to the Army Committee of this Association. Since the commencement of the war this Committee has labored zealously and faithfully for the temporal and spiritual welfare of our soldiers, and their families, and the success of our glorious cause. Let those soldiers not be discouraged now, upon the eve of our severest, and, as we trust, our last and most glorious campaign, for want of the generous sympathy and support of their friends at home.

Munford, Chairman of the Army Committee, will be promptly acknowledged, and in accordance with a special agreement made with the Superintendent of the Southern Express Company, all express charges will be paid by them at Richmond, and without cost to the contributors.

Richmond, Va., April 13, 1864.

PARTIES interested are hereby notified, that the Board of Officers appointed "to examine into and report on the claims for the amount of claims" for "losses of slaves, which have been impressed by Confederate authorities, or under State laws, for the use of the Confederate government, and while engaged in laboring on public defenses, have escaped to the enemy, or died, or contracted diseases which have, after their discharge resulted fatally," is organized at Richmond, and has commenced its regular sessions.

Evidence of ownership, of the fact of impressment, of the age, soundness and value of the slave at the time of impressment; and of the loss of the slave, whether by escape or death, with the circumstances attending the same, must accompany the claims.

All the facts must be set forth in, and verified by affidavits of competent witnesses. Claims thus authenticated and avouched, may be addressed to Col. J. D. WADDELL, President Slave-Claims Board, Room 455, Richmond, Va.

AN APPEAL TO THE PEOPLE OF THE CONFEDERATE STATES.

The Directors of the Young Men's Christian Association of Richmond, respectfully submit to the benevolent and patriotic throughout the Confederate States, an appeal in behalf of the Soldiers' Families in this city. Since the commencement of the war, Richmond has been a refuge for those who have been driven from their homes by our ruthless enemies. Thousands of helpless women and children, not from the devastated counties of Virginia alone, but from nearly every State of the Confederacy, have sought an asylum in our midst.

Our citizens have been appealed to in innumerable instances to relieve the sick and wounded soldiers, to furnish shoes and clothing for soldiers in the field and hospital, and to afford food and shelter for their suffering families, and nobly have they, in the great majority of instances, responded to every appeal.

It is a written report from the Clothing Bureau, it appears that there are more than three thousand families in this city who are seeking employment from the Government in vain, and that those who obtain work are not fully employed. The wages received for their work will not enable these poor women to procure any clothing for their families. The principal food for themselves and children, without assistance, then, from the city and county generally, many instances of actual starvation must have occurred.

Our City Council has made most liberal appropriations for the purchase of supplies, both for gratuitous distribution and for sale at cost; but the agents employed for the purpose have not been able to procure the quantity of provisions required for this object.

Under these circumstances, we feel that it is our duty to appeal to our fellow-citizens throughout the Confederate States, to forward, without delay, contributions of money and supplies to the Army Committee of this Association. Since the commencement of the war this Committee has labored zealously and faithfully for the temporal and spiritual welfare of our soldiers, and their families, and the success of our glorious cause. Let those soldiers not be discouraged now, upon the eve of our severest, and, as we trust, our last and most glorious campaign, for want of the generous sympathy and support of their friends at home.
