The Senate met at 11 o'clock, Prayer by Rev. J. M. Atkinson of the Pres-

byterian Church. A proposition was received from the House to raise a joint select committee on the correspondence between Gov. Vance and President Davis on propositions of peace. On this question Mr. Outlaw moved that the Senate appoint three instead of two on this committee.

A message was received from the House disagreeing to a proposition from the Senate, to raise a joint select committee on the subject of conscription. Mr. Outlaw stated that he understood that the cause of disagreement on the part of the House to this proposition, was because it provided for an equal number on the committee from each house. He therefore moved that the action of the House be resisted, and the proposition sent back in its original form. Agreed to.

The committee on corporations reported favorably to the incorporation of the soldier's female orphan home of Forsythe county.

An engressed bill was received from the House to incorporate the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church of the Confederates. This bill embraces the cause of education, publication and of missions, as conducted by the Presbyterian Church, and prescribes no limit to the amount of property to be held by the corporation.

On motion of Young, the rules were suspended and the bill taken up. Mr. B.yden moved to amend the bill by limiting the amount of property to be held by the corporation to \$500,000.

Mr. Young opposed the amendment. He J. C. Smith, late Sheriff of Alexander, to colthought the limitation too small to meet the lect arrearages of taxes. Passed its several objects of the corporation.

The Battle of Thursday-

A writer from the battle field furnishes some interesting statements concerning the great battle of Thursday, the 12th. We copy a portion:

During the day two charges occurred which deserve to be mentioned. About two o'clock, whilst the enemy wore heavily presing our right centre, Mahone's Virginia and Lane's North Carolina brigades were ordered to charge the enemy in their front in order to relieve the line thus heavily pressed. This was most gallautly executed. The result was that we captured some two or three hundred prisoners and four stands of colors. Lat r in the day Lane's brigade was ordered to take the assaulting column and a bettery in flank as a division. Led by their gallant General, the noble brigade. under a concentrated galling fire, charged the battery of six 12 pounder Napoleons, shooting down the cannoniers and capturing the pieces. The fighting was, in several instances, hand to hand, one officer having a tussel with a Yankee captain for his sword. The acts of individual bravery in this fight, as in that of the morning, were numerous. The battery horses not being at hand, the guns could not be brought off, but some four hundred prisoners and three stand of colors were captured and brought back to our

During the melee Gen. Lene, was ordered by some score of Yankees to surrender; but, unarmed as he was, he ordered them to throwdown their arms as his prisoners. The Yankees not readily complying, the General quietly remarked, "Very well, wait a moment, till my line comes up," whereupon they quickly threw down their arms, and the General made his

The extreme right and left of the lines were not engaged during this day, but from 9 until 12 o'clock in the day of Thursday, the enemy made repeated assaults in a leld's front, of Benning's, Law's and Grege's Brigades. Each time, however, this gallant division repulsed the enemy with fearful slaughter to the enemy, and with the loss of mere handfull of our men. During the day sn other parts of the line there was more or less skirmishing.

In this fight we lost many brave officers and men, among them Brig. Gen. Perrin, of Alabama, was shot dead whilst gallantly leading his brigule in the thickest of the fighta nobler spirit or braver man has not be n ffered a sarifice to this war. Brig. Gen. Diniel was wounded on Thursday, and died to-day; Brig. Gen. Stuart, of the Stonewall Brigade, was also wounded. His arm has been resected, and he is doing well; Brig. Gen. McGowan was wounded, but is better. I have taken pains to ascertain our losses in the fights of Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday last, and skirmishing before and since until this time, and my estimate of it is 3 500 wounded and 500 killed, and perhaps we have lost 3 000 prisoners. The losses of the enemy in these three days' fights are put down at the lowest estimate, at tuirty thousand men. The enemy surely must be well nigh exhausted; and it is certainly true, as it is said Gen. Lee has expressed himself, that Grant's men are whipped, but Grant is himself, not whipped. Grant has two or three lines of strong, fortifications behind which to retire if pressed. General Lee is well fortified, as Grant knows by sad experience.

Yesterday there was nothing of interest and to day there is nothing but skirmishing. Our men are firm in their conviction of ultimate success, and sing cheerfully around their cump fires at night. General Lee stands the fatigue well, and his friends say he is most cheerful and bouyant. I could write almost indefinitely, but time presses.

SUNDAY MORNING, May 15th 1864 - The enemy vesterday threw a force of infantry on our extreme left and engaged our cavalry proteeting that flank. Our cavatry (Chambliss' brigade) fought them a considerable time, when they were reinforced by infantry, driving the enemy back and capturing from bim some 70 or 80 prisoners. Everything is quietat 12 o'clock to-day.

The bearing of most of our troops were superb on Thursday last, but Harris', Mahone's, Lane's and Pegram's brig ides, I have heard specially commended, as also the whole of Rodes' and Feilds, divisions.

Early and Anderson, as commanders of corps have shown extraordinary abilities and fitness for their positious.
