


In the fight last Thursday, Mahone's brigade, for the first time during the war, was engaged in a most spirited hand to hand contest with a brigade of the enemy, and amidst the cracking of firearms, the falling of generals and the hestile commingling of the rebels and vankees, many a scane was enacted, which divested of its terrors, would have been ludicrous, for here and there a man would suddealy find himself master of some half dozen prisoners, as suddenly find himself a prisoner only to be released again in a few seconds by other rebels; privates would be seen seizing officers and officers privates, burrying them to the rear. One of our officers finding binself collared by a yankee captain, suddenly gave the captain such a lick across the head with his sword, as to cause his own immediate recase, while numerous empty guns placed in apparent dangerous contact to yankee tien. breasts, caused many of them to quickly throw down their own weapons and march to the mar. One of the ambulance corps of the 12th, with a gun statched from the ground that would not fire, captured some ten prisoners and a beautiful stand of e lors belonging to the 51st Peunsylvania regiment, while another of the same corps, with a stretcher upon his shoulder, also brought in several prisoners .--S me six hundred or more prisoners were taken during the brief conflict, while the yankces did not capture more than a dezen during the same time.

From the Atlanta Intelligencer, June 3. IN THE FIELD, May 30th, 1864.

To my last letter I appended a postcript which stated that movements were expected, About one hour afterwards the yankees opena terrific fire along our lines, and the reserves ware ordered to advance and prepare to support our men in the line. The yankees, relying on the darkness, charged along nearly the whole extent of our line of battle; but, after a severe struggle, were repulsed with tearful loss.



23d year of his age. Ligut. Haywood, the youngest son of the late Hon. Win. H. Haywood, was born on the 21st of December, 1841, and entered the service of the Confederate States as a private in the 7th Regiment N. C. Troops, at the time of its first organization, in the summer of 1861, and has served ever since with that well known regiment, in its numerous battles and exhausting campaigns.

He was present with his regiment during the bloody battles around Richmond, and at the bat-, tle of Cold Harbor narrowly escaped death-a musket ball passing through his cartridge box. grazing but not injuring his body. On the 1st of September, 1862, at the battle of Ox Hill, Lioutenant, then private Haywood, received a wound which compelled him t. leave the field, but he did so reluctantly, and before doing so, reported in Erry Geo. 1. O'B. Branch, to where he tra-dered his services as a messenger during the rest of the battle. Gen. Branch seeing his wounded condition, declined the service tendered, but afterwards complimented Lieut. Haywood highly for his conduct, and recommended him for promo-

On the 13th of December, 1862, at the battle of Fredericksburg, while the fight was raging hottest. a volunteer was called for by the gallant and la-mented Lieut. Col. Junius L. Hill of the 7th, to perform the dangerous service of carrying a message to Brig. Gen. Lane, in full view and under the deadly fire of the enemy's sharp shooters. Lieut. Haywood promptly undertook and successfully performed this dut ; and being commended for his conduct by Col. Hill, was promoted a Lieu-tenant from this date, for his gallantry; and he continued in this position until he rendered up his life. On the memorable 5th of May, 1864, at the bloody battle of the Wilderness, when the Northern hordes were so gallantly and successfully repulsed, Licut. Haywood received his death wound, and on the 6th of May, the day following. be expired. Thus again have his bereaved and almost broken hearted family been called upon to lay another sacrifice on their country's altar for freedom's sake. Not two years since, an elder brother fell, at the same age, on the bloody field of Cold Harbor, staining with his life's blood the battle flag of the same regiment which he was bearing forward in the charge ; now his widowed

The loss of the yankees is said to be absolately fearful. Up to this hour, one thousand dead bodies have been buried, and there yet remains a large number lying on the field. Among those killed is a yankee Brigadier General. His head was shot off by a shell, and only the star on his shoulder strap was the evidence of his rank. I have not learned his name. From the number of dead left on the field. I can safely say that the loss of the enemy within forty-eight hours must exceed ten thousand in killed and wounded, while our less is not more than two thousand.

DESPERATE FIGHTING OF N. C. TROOPS-ENCOUNTER WITH INDIANS -- We find the following in the Goldsboro' State Journal of May 25th :

C. Regiment, states that Ramseur's brigade had been in two despera e engagements with the enemy up to the 9th May. In the first one line of our troops drove back five lines of the enemy near Spotsylvania Court House, when ordered to charge, they could not go out of a walk, and some could not go at all. When the colors of the 2d regiment were advanced to the enemy's works, only 15 men were there with Capt. Cobb, Capt. Whitfield and Lt. Hobson. Both parties fought desperately. Our men clubbed the Yankees with their muskets, and their gallant officers snatched the enemy's guns from their hands, pulled them out of their entrenchments, and fore-d the surrender of the enemy.

Near Germanna Ford, Ramseur's brigade had to contend with Indian sherpshooters of the Ojibwa tribe, from the State of Michigan; and our men captured a number of Iodian mockasios and other beaded work.

Since this letter was written we learn that Capt. N. B. Whitfield has been killed; Lieut. B. W. Cobb wounded. All the casualties we can now report from the Second,

and bereaved mother mourns her youngest sonher Benjimin-offered up in her declining years, among the martyrs who have died for this blood stained land. The unflinching bravery of Wm. Haywood was a proverb in his regiment. When wounded he suffered no pain, but knew that his hour was come. Calmly and serenely he awaited the moment of that awful change ; and as he had endured without a murmur the dangers and hardships and trials of his soldier's career, so he cheerfully gave up his life for his bleeding and suffering country. Closing with a glorious death his unfinished career, knowing "that wisdom is the old age of youth, and an unspotted life the gray hairs of the yourg."

First Corporal JOHN T. STOVALL, third son of John W. Stovall, of Granville county, N. C., enlisted in Company K, 55th Regiment N. C. T., in December 1862. He was wounded at the battle of Gettysburg, and taken prisoner. He returned home, under parole, in September or October, where he remained, still suffering from his wounds. until February, when he returned to his Regiment before he was entirely well. He was engaged in the battles of the 4th and 5th of May, and escaped unhurt ; but on the 11th day of May be was mortally wounded in the head and died on the 14th, in the 20th year of his age. Licut. A private letter from an officer in the 2d N. Chandler writes on the 16th -"I can say, not with a flattering tongu ., but with undisguised delight, that a truer, pobler and better soldier than John, has not sacrificed his life for this our beloved country; and words are inadequate for me to exthey were opposed by Burnside's troops, and press my regret at his loss, although he died a one line of our troops drove back five lines of victorious death." Johnie wrote to his sister on the 27th day of April, the following consoling words : "Sister, probably I may be killed instantafter a weary days march and no sleep for two Iv before the close of this campaign, and if I nights. > Among the many casualties of Spotsylvania C II., we are called upon to mourn the loss of Rou EDICK COTTEN DAVIS, of Chapel Hill, N. C., aged 25 years and 15 days. He was the eldest son of Dr. J. Z. Davis of that place, and grandson of General R. C. Cotten of Pittsboro', N. C. At the commencement of the war he promptly joined the ranks, where he remained for the greater part of three years, nobly discharging his duty, till on the bloody field of the 5th he yielded his life a sacrifice upon the altar of liberty. He was a true patriot, a brave and gallant soldier, a dutiful and affectionate son, a conscientious and devoted christian. One of those who in camp were led to see the beauty of Godliness, he sought and found that pearl of greatest price, and has left behind him the best of all legacies, a good example and the weight of his influence in behalf of early piety. A few moments before his death, he entrusted to a friend and comrade his last earthly message for the far distant loved ones. "Tell them I die resigned : may they all meet me in heaven." Then while we mourn, let us not repine; while we weep let us not murmur; for the Lord gave and He hath taken away; let us then say, "Even so, Father, for it seemeth unto Thee good. C. E. A. Subjoined is a copy of the sections of the act authorizing the new issue ;

SEC. 6. That to pay the expenses of the Government not otherwise provided for, the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby authorized to issue six per cent, bonds to an amount not exceeding five hundrad millions of dollars, the principal and interest whereof shall be free from taxation ; and for the payment of the interest thereon the ontire net receipts of any export duty hereafter laid on any collon, tobacco and naval stores, which shall be exported from the Confederate States, and the net proceeds of the import duties laid, or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay annually the interest, are hereby specially pledged : Provided that the duties now laid upon imports, and hereby pledged, shall bereafter be paid in specie, or in storling exchange, or in conpons of said bonds.

Sec 8. The bonds authorized by the 6th section of this act, may either be registered or coupon bonds, as the parties taking them may elect, and they my be exchanged for each other under such regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe ; they shall be for one hundred dollars, or some multiple of one hundred dollars, and shall, together with the coupons thereto attached, be in such form and of such anthentication as the Secretary of the Treasury may prescribe ; the interest shall be payable half yearly, on the first of January and July in each year; and the principal shall be payable not less than thirty years from their date. ap. 23-75-dis.

Arriving in Virginia. he attached himself to the Fifth Regiment of North Carolina Cavalry and tendered his services to Maj. McNeil comd'g the Regiment, as Volunteer Aid. A few days after this, in an attack upon an entrenched position of the enemy on the James, under the most creditable circumstances he received a severe an 1 painful bruise from a spent ball. He however con tinued on duty till the fatal day when he was killed. At the time of his death, he was leading a cavalry charge, in most gallant style, against the enemy's sharpshooters. He died instantly. His hedy lies buried on the battle field near Ashland, where he met his sad yet glorious end.

I remember having heard The express the wish, if fate had decreed he should die in battle, that he might die at the head of a "dashing cavalry charge."-How truly-ah too truly has his wish been fulfilled.

At Malvem Hill, he first exhibited that utter contempt for danger that has since characterized him. Upon his bearing in this fight, he was com-plimented in an official report by his comd'g General. At the battle of Helena, Arkansas, in July last, his heroic daring was again conspicious, cliciting the applause of all who witnessed his con duct.

High minded, generous, brave. true, he was be-loved by all his friends, respected by all who knew him. In his death his country loses a gallant soldier; but his noble spirit has fled to a more congenial sphere, adding another bright star to the galaxy of true heroes, whose devotion to country-has been sealed by their life blood.

Let his afflicted relatives take consolation in the knowledge, that he perished fighting bravely in Braven's holiest cause ! J. W. H. Heaven's holiest cause ! Raleigh June 5th, 1864.
