AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN OR-DINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDI-NANCE TO SECURE TO CERTAIN OFFICERS AND SOLDIERS THE

RIGHT TO VOTE" 1 Be-it ordained by the Delegates of the prople of North Carolina, in Convention assembled, and it is hereby ordained by the anti crity of the same. That the proper returning of every county in this State shall include in their returns the votes of officers and soldiers given in any election in which they are entitled to vote by law, if received within twenty days after they are cast, and the said returning officers shall not make up their returns and declare the result of said elections until the expiration of twenty daysas aforesaid.

2. Be it further ordained That the proper return grafficer of every county, shall within eight days after the period fixed for compating the returns, transmit to the seat of government and deliver to the proper officer a statement of votes given in his county for Governor, which statement shall be made in the manner and

form now required by law 3. Be it ord ined, That the Governor be Mirected to make known, by preclamation, the provisions of the ordinance securing to offices and soldiers the right to vote. .

Batified the 8th dev of May, 1864. The foregoing ordinances contain the law which regulates the time at which officers and soldiers are to vote, the manner of appointing ns: em r., and also when and to whom the copy of votes polled and the list of voters shall be transmitted.

1 The officers and soldiers of this State, who by law are entitled to vote, if absent from their Tota on the Thursday before the day appointed for holding elections in the State, which this year occurs on the 4th day of August.

2. Three free helders of each company, under the direction of the commanding officers of the regiments to which they belong, shall even rolls and conduct the election in all respects according to the laws of the State.

3. The free-holders aforesaid shall provere fair copy of the votes nolled and her of the voters, and transmit the same to the Shoreff of the respective counties in which the voters reside, within twenty days after the votes are east, and the returning efficers of the'd flerent Counties shall not make up their teturns and declare the result of elections, until the expiration of twenty days as aforesaid, which occurs this year on the 17th day of August.
