When Bluffron, in South Carolien, and Darjen, in Cleargis, and Alexandria, La., and Washington N.C., were burned by our forces, there were not wanting those in the loyal States who deploted these several acts of wantonness or callousness as unworthy of honorable and christian warfare; but, partly from the remoteness of the scene of such wrong doing, and parly from a languid sense of indignation in all that concerns the misfortunes of the enemy, there was no very vivid or universal feeling on the subject. And we do not doubt that in the Confederate States there will be found multitudes who will unthinkingly applaud the burning of Chambersburg as an act of righteous retaliation, if not as commendable in itself.

We do not need to say to our readers that all such deeds of barbarism, whether committed by one side or the other, fix a stigma of disgrace upon our national character; and if any have been unable to realize the atrocity of these excesses so long as they were exclusivel committed by our troops, it is to be hoped that there native heinousness will be clearly perceived in the light of the burning homes of Chambersburg, and that for the credit of the national name, we shall not be called to chronicle such horrors in the future progress of the war.

A dispatch to the New York "Herald," dated Harrisburg, 31st ult, gives the following highly colored account of the burning of Chambersburg:

The Stoneman Raid.

From a late number of the Macon Confederate, we collect the annexed particulars in regard to the late raid. The facts were ga hered from Dr Browning, Stoneman's Chief Surgron, as well as other members of his staff:

As soon as it was known that Stoneman had left Sherman's army, Gen. Wheeler, on Wednesday July 28th, ordered General Iverson to take Martin's Division and pursue him. Gen. Iverson's command consisted of Allen's Alabama brigade, composed of the First, Fourth, Seventh and Fifty-first regiments; Crew's brigade, composed of the First, Third and Fourth Georgia; Cerro Gordo Williams' Kentucky brigade, composed of the First, Ninth and Eleventh Kentucky regiments, senior Colonel Butler acting as Brigadier; a battery of two gons commanded by Capt. White, and a section of Beeman's battery, two guns. The whole force did not number quite nine hundred men of all arms.

They struck the track of Stoneman south of Covington and reached Monticello Thursday night a few hours behind the enemy .-Resuming the march Friday, Gen. Iverson's advance came into Clinton about kalf an hour after Stoneman left that night. The main force, however, did not get to Clinton on Siturday before the advance of Stoneman on the retreat drave out the pickets. Gen. Iverson hen surveyed the country seven or eight miles worth-east of Clinton for a battlefield. He found a good position a short distance beyond Sunshine Church, posted his men and awaited

Saurday night found the pickets of the opposing forces confronting each other near Mr. Barfield's house. The enemy threw up barricades across the road and on either side at Barfield's house, extending out a good distance across the corn fields. Stoneman was left with only two things to do; force a passage along the read or surrender. There was no read leading off to the right or left that he could travel. The country was cut up with deep and impassable ravines, allowing no chance for artillery or baggage trains and but precious

little for horsemen even. Gen. Allen's skirmish line first encountered the enemy two hours before daylight Sunday morning. Irregular skirmishing continued until 2 o'clock, when the Georgia brigade was ordered forward to develop the position of the enemy. They soon found him in line of battle. Col. The purpose of this order is simply to organize the companies so as to sender them efficient in topelling raids, and in other emergencies. A prompt attendance is urged upon the men, and every man is reminded that it is to his interest not only to be present himself on the day appointed, but to see that his neighbors come to , as it will to necessary to retain them at the rendezvous till a sufficient rumber report to organize. As soon, on the other hand, as the organization is complete, the men will be permitted to return to their homes.
