Under the efficient management of the difforem staff departments, everything had been secured and transferred to the rear, including prisoners captured, artillery, small arms, subsistence, means of transportation, and nearly all of our wounded able to bear moving. No movement of any kind was made by the troops on either side during the most inclement day, until just at night, when a sharp skirmish owcurred between Polk's right and the enemy's left flank, resulting in nothing decisive. The only question with me was, whether the movement should be made at once or delayed 21 hours, to save a few of our wounded. As it was probable we should lose by exhaustion as many as we should remove of the wounded. my inclination to remain was yielded. The whele force, except the cavalry, was put in motion at 11 o'clock, p. m., and the army retired in perfect order to its present position, behind Duck river, without receiving or giving a shot Our cavalry held the position before Murfreesboro' until Monday morning, the 5th, when it quietly retired as ordered, to cover our front.

We left about 1200 badly wounded, one half of whom, we learn, have since died from the severity of their injuries, about 300 sick, too feeble to bear transportation, and about 200 well men and medical officers as their attendants. In addition to this the enemy had captured about 800 prisoners from us. As the 1200 wounded are counted once under that head among our losses, they should be excluded in the general total. As an offset to this loss, we had secured, as will appear from the cared, and appropriated to proper uses. Besides all this secured, we had destroyed not less than 800 wagons, mostly laden with various articles such as arms, ammunition, provisions, haggage, clothing, medicines and hospital stores. We had lost 3 pieces of artillery only, all in Breckinridge's repulse. A number of stands of colors, nine of which are forwarded with this report, were also coptured on the field. ### Mutual Relief Association.

At the adjourned meeting of the citizens, held on Monday, the committee appointed at a previous meeting, submitted through their chairman, George W. Mordecai, Esq., the following report:

The committee to whom it was referred to suggest some plan for the supply of provisions for the citizens of Raleigh, during the ensuing year, have had the same under consideration, and submit the following as the result of their deliberations:

1st. That an association be formed to be called "The Raleigh Mutual Relief and Benevolent Association," of which any person may become a member who shall subscribe a sum not less than one hundred dollars.

24. That upon all such subscriptions, the subscribers shall be entitled to receive interest at the rate of six per cent, per annum. until the money shall be refunded; but in the event of any loss being sustained, the subscribers shall only be entitled to receive pro rata upon the sums subscribed.

2d. That the sums subscribed may be refunded in whole or in part at any time that the Executive Committee may think proper, and any subscriber may require his money to be refunded to him at any time after six months from the time of subscription, upon giving thirty days notice.

4th. That the sums subscribed shall be laid out in the purchase of provisions and articles for the supply of the citizens generally, and of the immediate vicinity, who shall be permitted to purchase the same under such rules, regulations and instructions as mix be adoptaed by the Executive Committee.

5th. That this Association shall continue in peration for twelve months, unless somer discontinued at a general meeting of the subscribers, and when discontinued a statement or exhibit shall be made of its operations, and if any loss shall be sustained, the same shall be apportioned by the Executive Committee among the subscribers according to the amounts respectively subscribed; and should any profits have accrued, after refunding to the subscribers the amounts subscribed with interest thereon, at the rate of six per cent, per annum, such profits shall be apportioned among the subscribers so as to entitle them to receive not more than ten per cent, upon the amount sub cribed; and the supplies, if any, shall be appropriated to the fund for the relief of the poor and in-
