### The Latest from Georgia.

The following items are selected from the Constitutionalist, and Chronicle and Sentinel This is a direct line to Savannah from Millof the 25th :

FROM THE GEORGIA ROAD .- Trains ran up as far as Greensbord yesterday. Passengers could impart no information concerning the whereabouts of the enemy.

Qas hundred and forty-six Yankee prisoners were brought down last night from Athens. They were " gobbled up " by Graham's scouts, Texan Rangers, and squads of other comman.'s.

There was a rumor in town last night that the main body of Sherman was progressing towards the Altamaha river. Another rumor stated that a body of the Federals was within sixteen miles of Sparta. We cannot youch for the truth of either of these rumors. We merely give them as reported to us.

FROM THE CENTRAL RAILROAD - Gen. Wheeler with about ten thousand men has crossed the Oconee and effected a junction with Gen. Wayne. Gen. Wayne has successfully defended the bridge over the Oconee river. On this road the cadats of the Georgia Military Institute, who fought under him, have acquited themselves nobly.

The enemy have left Gen. Wayne's front, and are supposed to have joined the main body.

There are no Yankees this side of the Oconee river.

Another column is moving from Milledgeville with artillery. It crossed the Oconee and following paragraphs of the situation of affairs pursuing the road leading through Washington county, by the way of Saudersville, will strike the Central Rainroad about Station No. 14. edgeville.

A column, supposed to be Slecum's, numbering from two to three thousand infantry, is reported to be moving in conjunction with the cavalry above mentioned, on Sparta. At Sparta there are two roads, one leading to Augusta via Mayneld-another to Sandersville. Should this audacious raising party come this way, we are prepared to bestow a proper and becoming chastisement. It is probable, however, that, after ravaging the country about Sparta, it will combine with the column moving on the road to Savannah. Gen. Hardee telegraphs that he had left Macon perfectly secure. From Macon he went to Savaunah to make certain dispositions in that quarter. He is now where his services are demanded.

A lamentable state of ignorance seems to exist as to the whereabouts of Sherman's main body. It appears to us that reliable scouts from Greensboro' or Sandersville ought to know something about him. We hope our Generals are alive to the importance of such knowledge and have exerted themselves to acquire it. While we are trifling with small detachments, the enemy in bulk may be slipping away. We do not want him to slide off with impunity. After such hereniean efforts to administer a drubbing, it would be a pity to have him lose his paddy-whack.

THE SITUATION .- The latest reliable intelligence from the direction of Macon comes from our scouts sent out from Sparta. These scouts, who came in last evenbig, report that a body of from 600 to 1,000 Yankee cavairy had crossed the Ocence, and were moving slowly and nervously towards Sparta. Beyond some burning and stealing, this small band of troopers has no special significance -We have reason to believe that they will be sectionaly hashwhacked, and, we trust, cut to pieces.

One of the most encouraging features of this "invasion" is the fact, which we have from the most undoubted testimony, that hundreds, of the enemy are straggling from their main bodies and searching for somebody to take them into custody. They are sprawling all about the country, and those who are not willing to surrender can be beautifully bushwacked. Let all the old and young folks turn out and give the rase ils a taste of Georgia State sovereignty. This demoralization of our enemy is most providential for us. and ought to stiffen the backbone of the most timid amongst us.

Three hundred prisoners arrived last evening from up the Georgia Road, and four hundred more are to arrive to-day.

These prisoners report that a division of three thousand of our cavalry has followed them all the way, dashing upon them constantly, picking up stragglers and capturing wagons.

Gen. Wayne has whipped Kilputrick's carairy division at the Oconee Bridge, driving them headlong and in confusion. He telegraphs that he is perfectly able to take care of himself.

" Wheeler, with many thousand men, has intercepted the enemy at a point, at present unmentionable, and is giving them no rest night or day.

The main body of the enemy is moving down the western side of the Oc nee, and has shown no disposition, thus far, to attempt its passage.

The skies are brightening. Everything looks glorious, and ere long, Mr. Sherman will get a lashing that he little dreamed of when he made his "On to the Guif." The gulf of perdition be upon him !- Constitutionalist, 25th.

### Confederate Cavalry.

The following is an extract from the report of Hon. James A. Seddon, Secretary of War :

Some measures of Legislation are believed FIT to be expedient to maintain the number and increase the efficiency of the cavalry in the field. The policy of requiring the men to furnish their own horses was at all times doubtful, as, while affording apparently an inducement to greater care of the animal, it Interforce with dissipling and impairs efficien-3 cy. It also causes, almost of nece sity, the dismounting for long periods of those who, A having lost their horses, are unable to furnish them speedily or at all, and the absence, often on protracted furloughs, of the men who have sustained such losses, to procure other horses. Under the weariness of prono tracted service, and the eager longing for return home, which at times possesses even the F best soldiers, this chance of a furlough, is said to more than counteract the interest of ownership in the horse, and to continue a premium on neglect, or the allowance of casual-AT tics to disable their animals. A worse consequence, perhaps, is the tendency and temptation of the system to induce plundering and irregular modes of supplying themselves by the men. Those mounted are aware of the constant liability to the loss of their animal. and of the difficulty and expense of replacing them, and are under constant inducement to obtain reserve horses or means to purchase them. Those dismounted are even more strongly stimulated, by the inconveniences of their positions and the danger of being transferred to less acceptable branches of the service, to provide themselves by illegitimate means. These inducements are all enhanced by the limited class of casualties for which the value of the horses lost is repaid under present law, and the delays and embarrassments encountered in affording proof and obtaining payments. Horses are paid for, too, only at the valuation assessed T rior at the time they are taken into service, and n with the fluctuations in the value of our currency and the enhancement of prices resulting from the increasing scarcity of the proper horses, the value repaid is generally grossly inadequate. If the present system is to contitue, it is indispensable that there should be wider range to the casualties in which the value is repaid more liberally in the assessment of value, and greater facilities for prompt payment. The class of men who constitute our cavalry, while among the most spirited and active of our citizens, are yet generally, from previous independent habits of life, most difficult to discipline and subject to subordination. Entering immediately on service, they have enjoyed few opportunities of previous drill or training, and from the detached and often irregular service in which they are frequently employed, they are much removed from the restraints and responsibilities of large commands. They are but two apt, therefore, while individually galnov 25-d10t\* lant and enterprising, to be wanting in organization, in discipline, and the efficiency and reliability which should belong to trained troops. Our cavalry have performed many achievements of valor and utility, but they have also, on occasions of great importance, shown want of vigilance or constancy, and 'caused disaster. These defects are believed to spring, not from deficiences in the men, but in the system of selection and of training. It is believed it would be wiser that the cavalry should be gradually constituted of men picked from the trained and veteran soldiers for their peculiar qualifications," and that they should be mostly mounted and equipped at the public expense It might be made a penalty for the less of their horses, through neglect, or any other than the inevitable casualities of war that the man should be returned to infantry services. This would probably be found more efficient than, under the present system, private ownership has proved, to obviate neglect and secure due attention to the animals, while it would remove all inducements from self-interest or undue caution or escape under the legitimate hazards of war. There would be the certainty, too, that the men were trained and disciplined and habituated to fight as infantry, which, in many instances, our cavalry, from the nature of the country, or the like tactics of the enemy, are compelled to do.
