In the House of Representatives, on Thursday last, the morning hour having expired, Mr. Foote, of Tennessee, rose to a question of privilege.

Mr. Foote rose to a question of privilege. He had been prevented from attending the sessions of the House by the interference of other persons. His rights had been invaded and his reputation assailed, and he wished to be heard in their vindication.

Thirty-five members of this House had voted, in his absence, that the arrest and detention which he had suffered, were a breach of his privilege as a member of the House.

Mr. Foote proceeded to state the privileges of legislators, as understood in England. The House and detention of a member of Parliament while Parliament is in session, would be punished by the House.

Mr. Foote then read a letter of resignation which he had addressed to the Speaker under date of the 10th inst., but which had been delayed in transmission and had come again in his possession.

Mr. Foote said he learned afterwards that the bill which was reported to the House, was not intended to take the oath of allegiance to the United States at Alexandria, when he had no idea of doing so.

Mr. Foote proceeded to detail other reasons for his resignation, and stated that he had been appointed to a position in the War Department, and that he had been ordered to report to the Secretary of War.

Mr. Foote then proceeded to detail at much length on what he deemed the errors and the policy of the Executive and of Congress, and the disasters that had resulted and the dangers which had been produced.

Mr. Foote said he would content himself with publishing the remarks he had designed to submit. He concluded by saying that his purpose was to proceed to his constituents as near to them as he could.
