LARGE FLEET IN JAMES RIVER—ARRIVAL OF YANKEE PRISONERS—HALLECK AND McCLELLAN—CAUSE OF McCLELLAN'S REMOVAL—NECESSITY FOR ACTIVE OPERATIONS IN VIRGINIA—THE HERALD AND THE RADICALS—THE BRITISH CABINET, ETC.

The enemy has a numerous fleet in lower James River in the neighborhood of Brandon Bar.

One hundred and twenty-six Abolitionists captured by eleven of our cavalry at Snicker's Gap were brought to this city last evening.

A letter written by Gen. Halleck to Secretary Stanton shows that Halleck on the 1st of October advised a forward movement by the army of the Potomac and actually ordered it and that neither of these movements being carried out it is inferred that this led to the removal of McClellan.

The Washington Chronicle says that the removal of McClellan was the result of long and patient consultation on the part of the highest military authorities and that it must be regarded purely as a military question.

The New York Herald says that McClellan is fallen a victim to the machinery of the radical Abolition faction. His unpardonable crime has been his persistent refusal to make the cause of the Union secondary to the cause of negro emancipation.

The British Cabinet meeting was not held on account of the non-arrival of Queen Victoria who was detained at Brussels by inclement weather.

MORE OF McCLELLAN'S REMOVAL—HE AND BURNSIDE WEEP—THE YANKEES IN A STEW—JOHN VAN BUREN SPEAKS HIS MIND, ETC.

The order removing McClellan is dated the 5th, and reads thus: "By the direction of the President of the United States it is ordered that Maj. General McClellan be relieved from command of the army of the Potomac and that Major General Burnside take command of that army."

The New York Herald's Warrenton correspondent says: "The removal was entirely unexpected by every body here. Tears coursed down McClellan's classic features and Burnside with his stout heavy frame wept like a sorrowing child."

At a New York democratic meeting John Van Buren said that McClellan was removed because he was a democrat and that Burnside is put as a mere intermediate between McClellan and some abolition General that is to be put at the head hereafter.

A dispatch from McClellan to Gen. Meigs on the 24th of October says that he foresaw no time when an army of over 100,000 men will not call for clothing and other articles.

Intelligence direct from the army to-day represents everything quiet. The reported fight at Harper's Ferry proves to be untrue.
