FROM BURNSIDE'S ARMY—THREATENED TROUBLE WITH FRANCE AND SPAIN—MCCLELLAN A LION, IF NOT A GENERAL—LORD LYONS AND SEWARD, ETC.

Baltimore papers of the 14th have been received here. A correspondent with Burnside's army telegraphs that the Federal forces was 15 miles beyond the Rappahannock river and south of Winchester.

On the 12th instant some of the most prying of the Washington correspondents assert that the condition of the foreign relations were threatening, especially with France and Spain.

Gen. McClellan is besieged with visitors from New York, Philadelphia and other places. On Thursday evening the citizens of Trenton, New Jersey, gave him an overwhelming demonstration.

Lord Lyons recently had an interview with Seward and Yankee correspondents speaking of the interview say that nothing whatever of official character has been received from England or any other European power indicating an intention to interfere with our political affairs in the recognition of the South.

LATEST FROM THE NORTH—PROTECTION ASKED FOR NEW YORK HARBOR—RESISTING THE DRAFT—MCCLELLAN TO BE MADE SENATOR—CHASE GETS A LOAN ETC.

Northern papers of the 14th and 15th furnish additional items of interest.

Gen. Halleck visited Watertown on the 12th inst. and was heartily received by officers of the Army.

Gov. Morgan and Collector Barry visited Washington to urge adequate and immediate protection for New York Harbor, and the requisite orders were issued.

The draft in Wisconsin was resisted in Ascona by a mob who destroyed the draft box and rolls and attacked the private residences of several prominent citizens.

McClellan is proposed for the vacant Senatorship in New Jersey. A complimentary dinner will be tendered him in New York.

A temporary five per cent loan of twelve millions asked for by Chase has been filled up by New York bankers, and nearly the whole amount paid in. It is reported that Chase hastened this negotiation because of serious demands upon the Government by European powers which might lead to grave complications.

YANKEES ADVANCING ON FREDERICKSBURG—PEOPLE LEAVING—TOBACCO BURN—EXTRAVAGANT RUMORS—NEW SECRETARY OF WAR, ETC.

A report reached Fredericksburg last night that the Yankees were again advancing on that place to occupy it in consequence of which large quantities of manufactured tobacco belonging to merchants was destroyed.

This morning the excitement and apprehension among the people increased and a large number left town. The mail train which left about noon

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and arrived here at 6 o'clock brought down a number of refugees. At the time of departure, the enemy had not appeared but were believed to be within 15 miles.

Gen. Gustavus W. Smith, commanding this department, has been appointed Secretary of War ad interim.

[second dispatch.] RICHMOND, Nov. 17. Latest from Fredericksburg say the army appeared on the opposite side of the river.

PAYMENT OF STATE BOUNTY DUE DECEASED SOLDIERS. Executive Department, North-Carolina, Raleigh, October 17th, 1862.

REGULATIONS. 1. The payment of bounty to the representatives of deceased soldiers is based upon the certificate of the Commanding Officer of the company, who will state the time of the enlistment of the soldier, the date of his decease in service, the amount of bounty to which he is entitled, and that the claimant and applicant to which he belongs.
