REPORTED FOR THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.

DEATH OF HON. WM. B. PRESTON.

RICHMOND, Nov. 18.

Hon. Wm. Ballard Preston, one of the Confederate Senators from Virginia, died at his residence in Montgomery county on Sunday the 16th inst. He had filled a number of posts of honor and responsibility.

ELECTION OF SENATOR.

AUGUSTA, Nov. 18.

Hon. Herschel V. Johnson was elected to the Confederate States Senate by the Legislature now in session at Milledgeville, to day.

THE YANKEES IN FORCE AT FRANKLIN-TWELVE OR FOURTEEN OF THEM TAK-EN-NO FLEET IN JAMES RIVER, ETC. PETERSBURG, Nov. 18.

The enemy supposed to number considerably over one-brigade, appeared at Franklin this morning, on the Blackwater, and attempted to cross under cover of shells. The Confederate forces resisted, and successful for two hours, when the abolitionists retired. . We captured 12 or 14. Our loss none so far as heard from.

Parties direct from Lower Brandon assert that there is no fleet in that vicinity, nor has there been any. No fleet in sight up or down the river.

A NEW SECRETARY OF WAR.

RICHMOND, Nov. 14. James A Selder, of Virginia, has been appointed Secretary of War. He formerly represented this District in the United States Congress and was a member of the Peace Congress.

FROM FREDERICKSBURG. - The Examiner of Tuesday says:

On Saturday evening Col. Ball, commanding our cavalry at Fredericksburg, received information that an overwhelming abolition force was advancing upon that point, ond at once prepared to evacuate. A considerable quantity of manufactured tobacco recently carried to that town to be shipped North, was fired and burnt by our troops. Great consternation was occasioned among the citizens by the firing of the tobacco, the hasty stampeding of our topos, and the rumored advance of the enemy. Yesterday morning the excitement was still further increased by the report that the enemy was within fifteen miles of the town, and a number of citizens took advantage of the railway train, which left at noon, to fly to Richmond. But up to the time of the departure of the train, no enemy had entered the town. As the telegraphic operator is generally, in times of panic, the first man to bundle up and take to his heels, we are without later advices than that brought by the passengers on

Latest News by the Mails. The Wilmington Journal of Monday says:

We learn there were two new cases this morning, none on Saturday or Sunday-two burials Saturday one yesterday and two deaths last night. The disease seems to linger. It is dying out, but it dies hard.

The yankees about Suffolk seem to be getting impudent. The Petersburg Express of yesterday says: The enemy appeared in large force in front of Frank-lin yesterday morning, and shelled the place furiously for upwards of two hours. They made strong attempts to cross the Blackwater, but were kept at bay by our forces, who in the skirmishing captured some twelve or fourteen of the invaders. The strength of the encmy at this point is supposed to be largely, over a bri-

There has been constant skirmishing between the opposing forces on the Blackwater for several days past, but the results have been unimportant.

The Examiner learns the loss of the enemy in the artillery duel near Fredicksburg on Monday was 19 killed and wounded, and on our side 2 killed and 5 wounded. The Yankees are said to be in large force on the opposite side of the river, but the Confederates held the town at last accounts, and express a determination to hold out unless driven away by hard fighting.
