THE YANKEES IN FORCE AT FRANKLIN—TWELVE OR FOURTEEN OF THEM TAKEN—NO FLEET IN JAMES RIVER, ETC.

The enemy supposed to number considerably over one brigade, appeared at Franklin this morning, on the Blackwater, and attempted to cross under cover of shells.

Parties direct from Lower Brandon assert that there is no fleet in that vicinity, nor has there been any.
