THE LATEST FROM FREDERICKSBURG—THE WOMEN AND CHILDREN LEAVING—TRAIN SHELLED—PORT ROYAL SHELLED—YANKS BELIEVED TO BE "CHANGING THEIR BASE," ETC.

Richmond, Nov. 23, 1862. The latest advices from Fredericksburg this evening state that the enemy have not yet executed their threat to shell the town, and we believe they have changed their programme.

MANASSAS ABANDONED BY THE ENEMY—STORES BURNED, &C. Richmond, Nov. 22. An official dispatch received this morning states that Manassas Junction and Stone Bridge have been abandoned by the enemy.

RETAIATION—PRESIDENT DAVIS PUTS HIS FOOT DOWN FIRMLY. Richmond, Nov. 22. The following communication from President Davis to Lieut. General Holmes commanding trans-Mississippi Department is published, dated Executive Office, Nov. 17, 1862:

GENERAL:—Enclosed you will find a slip from the Memphis Daily Appeal, of the 3d instant, an account purporting to be derived from the Palmyra (Wisconsin) Courier, a Federal journal, of the murder of ten Confederate citizens in Missouri by order of Gen. McNeill, of the U. S. Army. You will communicate by flag of truce with Federal officers commanding that department and ascertain if the facts are as stated. If they be so, you will demand the immediate surrender of McNeill to the Confederate authorities, and if this demand be not complied with you will inform said commanding officer that you are ordered to execute the first ten United States officers who may be captured and fall into your hands.

IMPORTANT FROM FREDERICKSBURG. Richmond, Nov. 21. The Fredericksburg Herald says that on Wednesday the Potomac was crowded with transports and many believed they were there to convey Burnside's troops to some other point, leaving enough behind to keep up appearances.

Richmond, Nov. 21. The impression is that the enemy have made a demand for the surrender of Fredericksburg but nothing positively known. Richmond, Nov. 22. Richmond, Nov. 22. The Baltimore American of Wednesday thinks that the Junction of the Fredericksburg and Gordonsville railroad will probably be the scene of battle in the next campaign.

Richmond, Nov. 22. The latest accounts from Nashville represent Rosecrans as awaiting the completion of repairs to the railroad between that city and Louisville, so that a regular receipt of supplies can be assured.

Richmond, Nov. 22. The second draft in Connecticut has been indefinitely postponed. Hon. W. M. Bigler has written a letter declaring to become a candidate for United States Senatorship and proposing a plan for adjustment of national troubles.

Richmond, Nov. 22. The Government trains still run out to Manassas Junction, but it is probable the road will soon be again abandoned and bridges destroyed.

Richmond, Nov. 22. Verel Cruz advices of the late state that no further engagements had taken place. Several vessels, including a French Man-of-War, had been wrecked in late gales.

A special dispatch to the Evening Post, dated Washington 18th, says it is believed that an attack upon Charleston will not be long postponed. The preparations for attack are so perfect that there can be no doubt whatever that one or more iron clads will succeed in approaching town, at least within shelling distance.
