THE LATEST FROM FREDERICKSBURG—THE WOMEN AND CHILDREN LEAVING TRAIN SHELLED—PORT ROYAL SHELLED—YANKEES BELIEVED TO BE “CHANGING THEIR BASE,” ETC.

RICHMOND, Nov. 23, 1862.

The latest advices from Fredericksburg this evening state that the enemy have not yet executed their threat to shell the town, and we believe they have changed their programme. Most of the women and children have left the town as a matter of prudence. Three shells were thrown at the train which left yesterday morning, but an apology was afterwards made for it.

Four shells were thrown to-day at the town of Port Royal, eighteen miles below Fredericksburg.

MANASSAS ABANDONED BY THE ENEMY—STORES BURNED, &c.

RICHMOND, Nov. 22.

An official dispatch received this morning states that Manassas Junction and Stone Bridge have been abandoned by the enemy. Stores in large quantities were destroyed: A large fire was seen at Bull Run, and the Railroad bridges were burnt. Sturgis' and Staples' divisions under Sedgell passed through Centreville to Washington.

LATER FROM THE NORTH—FROM NASHVILLE—BIGLER WANTS PEACE—FROM VERA CRUZ—CHARLESTON TO BE ATTACKED, &c.

RICHMOND, Nov. 22.

The Baltimore American of Wednesday thinks that the Junction of the Fredericksburg and Gordonsville railroad will probably be the scene of battle in the next campaign.

The latest accounts from Nashville represent Rosecrans as awaiting the completion of repairs to the railroad between that city and Louisville, so that a regular receipt of supplies can be assured.

The second draft in Connecticut has been indefinitely postponed.

Hon. W. M. Bigler has written a letter declaring to become a candidate for United States Senator and proposing a plan for adjustment of national troubles.

Wilmington has been evacuated by the Federals. The Government trains still run out to Manassas Junction, but it is probable the road will soon be again abandoned and bridges destroyed.

Ver Cruz advises of the 1st state that no further engagements had taken place. Several vessels, including a French Man-of-War, had been wrecked in late gales.

A special dispatch to the Evening Post, dated Washington 18th, says it is believed that an attack upon Charleston will not be long postponed. The preparations for attack are so perfect that there can be no doubt whatever that one or more ironclads will succeed in approaching town, at least within shelling distance.

LATER FROM THE NORTH—THE GRAND ARMY ADVANCING—RICHMOND THE DESTINATION, &c.

PETERSBURG, Nov. 22.

Flag of truce boat to City Point to-day brought over 100 paroled Confederate prisoners. New York, Washington and Baltimore dates of Wednesday the 19th received.

All agree that the grand army has taken up line of march for Fredericksburg, and that Hooker's, Sumner's and Franklin's corps all moved from Warrenton Sunday and Monday last for Aquia Creek.

The Tribune says Burnside originates the movement and his heart is in it. It means business, rapid marching and change of base to a more direct, indefensible line—it means Richmond.

Among division and corps commanders the belief obtained, that under Burnside there will be no more fruitless or drawn battles, and that when clash of arms come again it will bring crowning victory or overwhelming defeat, and will be a day big with the fate of the Republic, &c.

The Philadelphia Inquirer says Fredericksburg base is considered the best one for operations upon the heart of Virginia.

Nashville dates of the 18th say Gen. Rosencrans and command is here within twelve miles of the city.
