### TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LATEST FROM FREDERICKSBURG-ALL QUIET ETC.

RICHMOND, Nov. 25. Persons from Fredericksburg to-day say that all is quiet and no demonstrations on either side. The impression is that the enemy have moved the bulk of their forces towards Aquia Creek, though their pickets extend to the Rappahannock river. Some refugees have returned.

FURTHER FROM THE NORTH AND FROM EUROPE. RICHMOND, Nov. 24. RICHMOND, Nov. 24. gymen brought from New Orleans have been used with kindness and attention.

A dispatch from Fairfax C. H. says the rebel force which destroyed the stores at Mana esas numbered eight thousand. When their approach was discoved a panic enrued among the Yankee soldiers, and a Wisconsin and New York regiment threw away their arms.

At a meeting recently held at Exter Hall, England, Mr. Derby, of Somerset, first Judge of Admiralty, Cabinet Minister, said that an offer of mediation might be received only with resentment, and that time and opportunity must be therefore carefully watched. The only way to restore peace, as far as he could see, was by mutual conession on part of the beligerents.

BURNSIDE'S DEMAND FOR THE SURRENDER OF FREDERICKSBURG-THE MAYOR'S REPLY, ETC. PETERSBURG, Nov. 25.

The following is a condensed account of the corresponience between Gen. Sumner and the Mayor of Fredericks-

General Patrick crossed the river on Friday, the 21st instant, under flag of truce, with a communication from Sumner to Mayor Slaughter, stating that under cover of the houses of the city shots had been fired upon troops of his command, and that mills and manufactories were furnishing provisions and material for clothing for armed bodies in rebellion against the Government of the United States. This condition of things, he says, must terminate, and by direction of Major-General Burnside I command the surrender of the city at or before 5 o'clock, p. m., and failing to receive the affirmative reply sixteen hours will be allowed for the removal of non-combatants, which period having clapsed he will proceed to shell the

The Mayor replied that the firing of shots upon his troops on Northern suburbs was an act of the military for which the citizens were not responsible. In regard to other matters of complaint he-was authorized to say that the mills and manufactories will not furnish any further supplies for Confederate troops, but the military authorities inform us that while their troops will not occupy the town they will not permit yours to do so. "Summer replied that in consideration of this pledge and ascertaining that the time for the removal of women and children is insufficlent he would not open upon the town at the hour designated. The correspondence closed with a nate from Sumner saying that so long as no hostile demonstration is made on the town it will not be shelled.

FROM SOUTH CAROLINA-GOV, PICKENS' MES-SAGE, &C.

COLUMBIA, Nov. 25. The Legislature met here to-day. Gov. Pickens' message was received at noon yesterday. He urges a cordial support of the Confederate authorities in measures for ject to the Conscript Law though viewing all such acts as against the spirit of the Constitution. He alludes to Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation and recommends the formation of a State Guard of citizens under 18 and over 45 for police duty ;-makes an appeal for the relief of soldiers families, and also for immediate clothing of the soldiers in the field. He says the State has furnished 42,000 Confederate troops, besides eight regiments of State troops for Coast service. He advocates an amendment to the State Constitution, granting the privilege of suffrage to those who were citizens when the Confederate Constitution was adopted, and those born in the Con ederacy. He also urges the prompt drganization of pegro labor so that the fortifications around Charleston

He pays a glowing tribute to Southern women and especially to the women of Virginia, to whom South Carolina owes everlasting gratitude. The remainder of the message is occupied with consideration of the financial policy of the State.
