Petersburg, Dec. 10. New York dates of the 8th instant have been received here. No movements by Burnside's army...

It is stated that a body of rebels were occupying Thoroughfare Gap and Warrenton Junction on Saturday.

Col. Wyndham was out to make a reconnaissance. While he issued a proclamation ordering an election for Congress for the district of Norfolk...

These rebel schooners attempted to run the blockade into Wilmington on Wednesday last, and were captured by the blockaders. All from Nassau. One was the Emma Tuttle, another the Brilliant, and the third, an adverb, name unknown.

Interesting correspondence recently passed between Henry A. Wise and Gen. Keyes relative to the treatment of Lunatics in the Asylum at Williamsburg. Seventy-five thousand dollars have been subscribed at New York for the operatives at Lancaster, England.

A fire occurred in the guard house at Harper's Ferry on Saturday night, where rebel prisoners are confined, which consumed two government buildings and the Government Telegraph office. Loss twenty thousand dollars.

The rebel salt-petre and powder mills at Tallville, Ark., have been destroyed by a portion of Blunt's command.

The Herald conjectures that Banks' expedition is destined to advance upon Richmond by way of the York and James rivers.

Granada was recaptured by Union Cavalry on Monday, Dec. 1st, and fifteen locomotives and one hundred cars were burned.

Gen. Hesseau has made a forward movement towards Murfreesboro.

Gold in New York was 131 3/4 and Exchange 143. Cotton dull. No quotations. Three millions bales from South expected.

REPORT OF THE YANKEE WAR SECRETARY.

The Yankee Secretary of War reports that in the ten military districts which the South is divided by the Yankees, the armies of the Yankees, according to official reports of a late date, numbers 376,000 men, and that since the date of these reports these numbers have been increased to 800,000. The wonder is, not that they are so numerous, but that they should have done so little. Eight hundred thousand men ought to conquer the world, and were they anything else than Yankees they might be expected to do it still. But the Yankee is not formed for conquest, unless it be over tribes of wretched Indians. The Secretary says that when the quotas shall have been filled up, his army will number a million. Of course he then expects to crush out the rebellion in less than sixty days. With all this enormous force to back his enterprise, and with so little yet done, we had supposed the Yankee Secretary would say as little as might be of Yankee valor. Yet he commends the bravery and discipline of his troops, and the skill of their officers, calling to witness York, where Magruder, with 8,000 men, brought 120,000 of them to a halt, Williamsburg, where half the army was beaten by Longstreet's division, Fair Oaks, Gallatin's Mill, Malvern Hill, Cross Keys, Cedar Run, Chantilly, &c., in every one of which they were routed by the Confederates, and, in consequence, were driven from before Richmond, out of Northern Virginia, and into Washington. Truly, Yankee impudence is a marvelous quality. It glories in its own shame, and boasts even of its own defeat. The next time we meet them, we shall hear them ascribing their defeat to overwhelming numbers. They will have forgotten all their Secretary says now about their overwhelming superiority. They will forget that he has had the world in his dilliwally of men ready to eat up the entire Confederacy.

The Yankee Secretary of War gives us a fuller view of the object the Yankees are aiming at than we have yet seen officially avowed. They intend, it seems, to conquer the South, to dispossess the inhabitants, and to settle it up with Yankees. There are thousands of Blue Noses, it appears, in the North-west eager to begin the work of colonization. This scheme does not involve the exile of the contraband, who is to stay among them, and work for Yankee employers at wages. The "Suits of the Earth," that is to say the Yankees, are thus to possess the whole earth. What is to become of the present inhabitants we are not told. It is said by the Secretary, however, that, as they have been guilty of treason, it is perfectly just to take everything they have. Hitherto the Yankees have pretended to be working for the abolition of slavery; but the cloven foot is now fully revealed. The war is a war for plunder on a gigantic scale. There has been nothing like it in modern times. The barbarians who destroyed the Roman Empire were the last who ever waged war for the extermination of the inhabitants and the occupation of their lands. We think the Yankees will be disappointed. We shall certainly be, if the end of the war be not to exclude them forever from the possession of a foot of land in the Southern Confederacy.

The Deputies of Savannah. The Georgia House of Representatives has finally laid on the table the bill appropriating money for the removal of the indigent women and children from Savannah in case of an attack. The bill is quite insignificant at this season, and calls upon the city to shoulder the expense which the Legislature has thus decided to assume.
