GOOD NEWS FROM GOLDSBORO—HARD FIGHTING—THE ENEMY DRIVEN BACK. We learned last night by telegraph from Goldsboro,

LATEST FROM GOLDSBORO—BURNING OF BRIDGE—ENEMY DRIVEN BACK, ETC. Goldsboro, Dec. 17.

Between two and three o'clock six Yankees, under cover of pines, reconnoitred the railroad bridge,

Late in the day our forces gallantly repulsed an attempt of the enemy to cross the county bridge

At the Battle at White Hall on yesterday the 11th Regiment, Col. Leventhorpe, had seven killed,

The slaughter of the enemy is said to have been heavy, our boys driving them from their like-frightened turkeys.

STILL LATER. Goldsboro, Dec. 17. The enemy has been driven three miles from his position this evening.

FROM KINSTON—MALLETT'S REGIMENT, &C. Goldsboro, Dec. 17.

Our troops reconnoitred Kinston Monday night, the abolitionists evacuating and burning the bridge.
