THE BATTLE OF FREDERICKSBURG-OFFI-

CIAL REPORT OF GEN. LEE.

The following official report from Gen, Lee was re-ecived at the War Office on Tucsday: Headquarters, Army Northern Vinginia, 14th December, 1862.

The Honorable Secre ary of War, Richmond Va.
Sin: On the night of the 10th instant, the enemy

commenced to throw three bridges over the Rappa-bannock—two at Fredericksburg, and the third about a mile and a quarter below, near their mouth of Deep

The plain on which Fredericksburg stands is so completely commanded by the hills of Stafford in pos-

session of the enemy, that no effectual opposition could be offered to the constructions of the bridges or passage of the river, without exposing our troops to the destructive fire of his namerous batteries. Po-

sitions were, therefore selected to oppose Lis advance after crossing. The narrowness of the Happahannock,

its winding course and deep bed had afforded oppor-

tunity for the construction of bridges at points beyond the reach of our artillers, and the banks had to be watched by skirmishers. The latter sholtering them-

at the lowest point of crossing, where no shall er could

In the afternoon of that day the enemy's batteries

icksburg. General Stuart, with two brigades of cav-

alry, was posted in the extensive plain on our extreme

As soon as the advance of the enemy was discovered through the fog, General Stuart, with his accustomed promptness, morel up a section of his horse artillery, which opened with effect upon his flank,

and drew upon the gallant Pelham a beavy fire, which he austained unflinchingly for about two hours. In

the meantime the enemy was fiercely encountered by General A. P. Hill's division, forming Gen ral Jackson's right, and after an obstinate combat repulsed.—During this attack, which was protracted and hotly contested, two of General Hill's brigades were diventaged.

contested, two of General Thil's brigades were driven back upon our second line.

General Early, with part of his division, being ordered to his support, drove the enemy back from the point of woods he had seized, and pursued him into the plain, until arrested by his artiflery. The right of the enemy's column extending beyond Hill's front, encountered the right of General Hood, of Long-

streec's corps. The eventy took possession of a small copse in front of Hood, but were quickly dispossessed

and repulsed with less.

During the attack on our right the enemy was crossing troops over his bridges at Fredericksburg and massing them in front of Longstreet's line. Soon

after his repulse on our right he commenced a series

of affacks on our left, with a view of obtaining pos-session of the heights, immediately overlooking the

town. These repeated attacks were repulsed in gal-lant style by the Washington Artillery, under Coh-nel Walton, and a portion of McLaw's division, which

occupied these heights.

The last assault was made after dark, when Colonel Alexander's Battalion had relieved the Washington Artillery, (whose ammunition had been exhausted,)

Our loss during the operations, since the movements of the enemy began, amounts to about eigheeen hundred killed and wounded. Among the former I regret to report the death of the patriotic soldier and statesman, Brigadier General Thomas R. R. Cobb, who fell upon our left; and among the latter that brave soldier and accomplished gentleman, Brigadier Comment Masser, Green, who was very seriously, and General Maxey Gregg, who was very seriously, and it is feared mortally, wounded during the attack on

our right.

The enemy to-day has been apparently engaged in careing for his wounded and burying his dead. His troops are visible in their first position in line of battle, but, with the exception of some desultory cannonading and firing between skirmishers, he has not attempted to renew the attack. About five hundred and fifty prisoners were taken during the engagement, but the full extent of his loss is unknown.

REPORTED VICTORY IN TENNESSEE. - Intelligence was received in Lynchburg Monday, (says the Repubwas received in Lynchburg Monday, kays the Republican of that city,) that our forces under General Johnston were attacked by the enemy, near Murireesboro', early on Saturday morning, when a terrific hattle ensued. The enemy far outminibered our troops, who gradually fell back before them a distance of about ten miles, contesting the ground inch by inches they retired, with bloody effects upon the Abelitionists.

Our troops received reinforcements Saturday night, when they rallied, and on Standay not only recovered.

when they rallied, and on Shaday not only recovered the ground they had lost, but in their turn forced the

enemy back a distance of four rolles from the point at which the fight commenced.

It is stated that the victory, while perhaps not decisive, is a glorious one, and as one of the fruits of it, it was confidently anticipeted that Nashville would be captured.

Passengers from the West yesterday evening, report the enemy's loss at five thousand. Our own is stated

by them to be heavy.

This intelligence, while not official is believed to be reliable. That a battle has been fought, we have cer-tain information, and it is hoped the reported result above is correct.—Dispatch.

Applications for exemption must, in all cases, be made to the Enrolling Officer of the District: duplicate copies of said application being made in writing, duly sworn to before an acting Justice of the Peace, and bearing the certificate of the Clerk of the Court, given under the County Seal and sent through the Colonel of the Regiment. An appeal may be taken from the decision of the Enrolling Officer to the Commandant of Conscripts.

V. All Conscripts engaged on Government works will be enrolled and returned to their said work.

In issuing the above orders for the enrollment of Conscripts between the ages of 18 and 40, the Commandant avails himself of the opportunity to thank the State Officers for their untiring and laborious efforts in the discharge of their duties and the efficient and ready assistance rendered to him in their official capacity heretofore.

The importance and absolute necessity of renewed energy and prompt action in executing these orders faithfully, is fully expressed in His Excellency Governor Vance's General Order, No. 10.
