## ARMY CORRESPONDENCE

FROM KINSTON AND GOLDSBOBO THE FIGHT

[FROM OUR OWN REPORTER.] Gornsnono', Dec. 17.

Fight commenced Saturday morning on the Wilmington road, about 6 miles from Neuse bridge, at the crossing of S. W. Creek, Col. McMaster and Col. #### THE "BLACK BRIGADE."

We are pleased to see that the people throughout the district railed for negroes to complete the fortifications around Savannah, are promptly responding to the action of the Legislature, without a resort to impressment. Hundreds of hands are coming in-daily, and every morning the Barracks yard in detted all over with their sable faces, really to be reported at head-quarters and assigned to their work, which they enter upon with the greatest alacrity. Their names, ages, value, and names of owners, are all first recorded in a book kept for the purpose, a work which ed in a book kept for the purpose, a work which keeps constantly engaged a considerable number of officials. Upon enquiry, we learn that in most of the conn-

ttes the people, as soon as they were informed of the law, held meetings and set apart, their quota of negroes and made arrangements for their transportation to Savannah, without waiting for the arrival of an officer to execute the law.
While this is the rule, we regrot to add that there

are mortifying exceptions. In very many counties a few individuals have refused to respond to the law and even shown a disposition to resist it. In such cases impressment has been necessary. The names should be recorded and made public as part of the history of the invasion of their State by an Abolition enemy an officer has promised to furnish them to us at an

early day.

One fact is worthy of note in these times of scarcity, and it speaks well for the owners of slaves in Georgia: Though taken promiscuously from the greater portion of the State, all these negroes look ro-bust and cheerful, are comfortably clothed with warm winter suits, and in many cases with overcoats and wear good hats and strong substantial shoes. # AFFAIRS ON BLACK WATER.

The Petersburg Espress of Thursday cays: A courier direct from Obn. Pryor's headquarters at Franklin, reached here yesterday evening with depatches for the General commanding this department. From this source we learn that all was quiet along the line of the Blackwater Saturday and up to the hour of five o'clock yesterday

morning.

In the skirmich at Zuni Friday afternoon, we are pleased to hear that our forces repulsed the invaders, with a loss to them of forty killed and wounded. Our loss was three wounded only.

wounded only. Joyner's Ford, four wiles below Zuni, we are inform risoners. We lost two killed, two wounded, and six prisoners. Among the latter is Capt. Sykes, who was also wounded. Our reinforcements at this point coming up at a time when the enemy was greatly elated with his little success, soon changed the state of affairs, and caused the Vandals to retreat with great precipitation. They left a flat boat on the other side of the river, which fell into our hands. Our informant states that the enemy is well pro-vided with boats, and never fails to bring one with him when he comes up from Suffolk.

RECONSTRUCTION .- The Richmond Whig strikes the nail on the lead when it says: The plan of ex-Senn-tor Bigler, of Pennsylvania, for ending the war consists of a suggestion that the Legislature of the Yau-kee States shall petition Congress to call a Convention for the purpose of "reconstructing the Constitu-tion," with the view of making it satisfactory to the Confederate States and including their return to the Union. Mr. Bigler mistakes the point of the difficul-ty. The fault was not in the Constitution, nor did the Southern States withdraw on account of dissatisfaction with that instrument. No alteration of it, even if such alteration were left altogether to themeven if such alteration were left altogether to them-salves, would begin to satisfy the Southern States.— What they object to, and what they never will cease to object to, is association with the Yankee race on any terms. If Senator Bigler could "reconstruct" the Yankee from head to beek, infast et in fide, in mind, beart, soul and body, so that there would be no atom or instinct of the original beast left, we might then consider the question of realising, but even then would be no atom probable determinents. probably determine that it is best for us to be alone.

AFFAIRS IN Mississiert .-- It appears by a correspondent of the Jackson Mississippinn that our forces under the veteran General Price have fallen back from Abbevitle, as he speaks of the army being in Grenada on the 5th. The men were well clad, well shod, and in fine spirits—making the welkin ring with "Missouri Land." There was a brisk fightat Okalona, on the Mississippi and Tennessee Railroad, on the 81 instant, in which the Texas troops displayed their characteristic bravery, driving back the enemy and eapturing two pieces of artillery, although opposed by a large force. Paou Gen. Flave's Commants.—It is reported, and generally credited, that the Virginia State Line, under command of General Floyd, has obtained asignal success over the enemy at a place-called Pikerton, on the Kentucky border. One account state that the enemy's forces numbering some five thousand were completely routed, and that nine flatboats, with valuable stores, were captured, and Col. Dilly and fifteen men were killed, and sixty prisoners taken. General Floyd is also said to have dispursed the Peter's Greek Home Guards, a band of Kentucky Unionists that have made themselves a terror along the Kentucky State line.—Disputch.
