LATER AND IMPORTANT FROM THE NORTH AND EUROPE.

FREDERICKSBURG, Jan. 8. N. Y. Herald and Philad. Enquirer 6th received here by fing truce. Resenceins' official dispatch to War Department gives history of the fight at Murfreesbore, which he says ended on Saturday in total defeat of the rebel army and disorderly flight to Tullahoma. The fight continued from Tuesday to Satunlay. He says the medical director estimates 5,500 wounded in hospitals and 1,000 killed.

Memphis Balletin says Vicksburg surrendered to Sherman after five days fighting. He was reinforced Sunday night by 9,000 from Grant's army. The whole Union force at Vicksburg estimated at 40,000 and Banks and Farragut hourly expected,

Herald gives additional particulars of the fight on Thursday between Gen. Sullivan and Forrest. The fight lasted all day, the rebels fleeing with loss of 1,400 killed, 850 horses, 1,000 stand arms and 6 guns. Sullivan's loss 600. .

GENERAL ORDERS,
No. 96.

Commandants of conscripts will cause the following order to be published for at least seven times in a sufficient number of newspapers in each State of the Confederacy to ensure its reaching every part of the country.

1. All commissioned officers and enlisted men who are now absent from their commands from any other causes than actual disability, or duty under orders from the Secty of War, or from their department commanders will return to their commands without delay.

11. Commissioned officers failing to comply with the provisions of the foregoing paragraph within a reasonable length of time, in no case to exceed twenty days after the publication of this order, shall be dropped from the rolls of the army in disgrace, and their names will be furnished to the commandant of conscripts for enlistment in the ranks.

Departments a prompt report of the names of all commissioned officers and enlisted men now absent from their commands. These reports must state in each case the cause of abscence, and any regimental, hattalion or company commander who shall neglect to furnish such a re-port, or who shall knowingly be guilty of concealing any
