JOSEPH WHEELER, the most youthful Brigadier n the Confederate service, has won undying honors luring the pendency of the great struggle in Middle Tennessee. His name has appeared in nearly every official dispatch; the telegraph never omits the name of Wheeler, and such has been his ubiquitousness, and such the multiplicity of his during deeds and achievements that the reporters for the Press from Murireesboro have persistently asserted that Porrest and Morgan were both in the rear of Rosencrans, cutting off his supplies and communication with Nash-Gen. Bragg, to a very great extent, asuribes the safety of our army on its withdrawal from Kentucky to the energy, skill and courage of Wheeler. When he visited the President at Richmond, in order to make a full exposition of the events of the Kentucky campaign, he insisted that Wheeler should be made a Brigadier. The President declined doing so, stating that Morgan and others, who had served longer, and with great distinction, had not been prometed. He also objected because Wheeler is a mere boy.

Gen Bragg was thus silenced. The next day he was again at the President's mansion, and inquired whether his Adjutant General was not entitled to a Brigadier's commission. The President said he was "Well then," said Gen. Bragg, "I now nominate and constitute Legal, Wheeler he constitute Juscoli Wheeler, jr., my Adjutant General. The President was not a little surprised, but re-

marked "if you know this young man so well, and value his services thus highly, he shall be a Brigadier, and not of your staff. Let him remain where

When transportation of troops or freights by rational is nocessary, a Quartermaster or other authorized officer, shall make requisition for the same upon the superfittendent or proper officer of the railroad, turnishing the necessary evidence of transportation, and delivering the troops or Treight to be transported.

111. In the event that more freight is to be transported.

over any road than the road has the ability to carry promptly, the officer furnishing evidence of transportation will indicate to the railroad officer what shall take precedence. In the absence of any special order as to what freight shall go first the railroad officer shall be governed. by any General order the Quartermaster General may issue regard thereto.

IV. Whose troops or freight is to be moved out, of the

in regard thereto.

IV. Whose troops or freight is to be moved out, of the usual routine of a railroad, the officer having charge of such movement, will hix with the superintendent or other officer of the road on which the movement is to be made the day wid hour of departure, and when so fixed, the troops or freight must be ready at the appointed time.

V. In the evoal of any military necessity for an unumal movement at any particular point the commanding officer at such a post will communicate fully the character and extent of service, to the principal officer of the road or roads from which this required, and ask the personal supervision of the propels railroad officers to the daity.

VI. Quartermastes and Commissities will exercise discretion in shipping freight not wanted for immediate use, and that may be stored at safe and convenient points, italiag care not to block up roads and thereby impede transportation.

VII. When it is necessary to send a special messenger with freight, such messenger must travel with the freight placed in his charge, and his transportation shall be so specified on its face, in order to prevent him from traveling in any other way.

VIII. Expediting officers will permit conscripts, carolled
