MILITARY NOTICES.

Adj't and Inspector General's Office, Raleigh, Jan. 3, 1863.

THE FOLLOWING ORDERS ARE PUBLISHED for the information and guidance of all concerned: Recognizing the necessity of officers of railroad having full control of their business in order to ensure safety and dispatch in transportation, military officers are prohibited from interfering with the engines, cars, running of trains, or with the control and management in any way of railroads.

When transportation of troops or freights by railroad is necessary, a Quartermaster or other authorized officer, shall make requisition for the same upon the superintendent or proper officer of the railroad, furnishing the necessary evidence of transportation, and delivering the troops or freight to be transported.

Any violation of these orders, or reliance on the part of railroad officers to perform promptly all Government transportation will be reported to Colonel William M. Wadley, A. A. G., who will indicate from time to time where his headquarters will be.
