THE LATE GEN. GREGG.

The Columbia Guardian publishes the following from a letter received from a member of Grey's Brigade:

The night before the battle I spent some time at Gen. Gregg's fire. He seemed thoughtful and said little. I did not see him again until he was being brought off the field. The enemy came upon our brigade most unexpectedly.—We had two lines; the one in front broke and retreated to wards the right without the General's knowledge. The enemy then advanced rapidly, and he, thinking them to be our men, rode up and down the lines, ordering the firing to cease. His men, however, saw the blue coats, and it was useless trying to stop their shooting. The General then found out his mistake, and turning about, cried of Fire; they are the enemy." He was immediately shot by a villain, who was seen to do it, and it is a little satisfaction to know that a Confederate rifle sent a bullet through the Yankee's bead instance. A member of the 12th regument aimed the rifle, and thinks he has done his country good service. The last hours of our old here's life were passed at a Mr. Yarby's where he received every attention. He was visited by numbers of the military, and so impressed were they with the resignation and cheerfulness with which he gave his life for his country, that very few dre eyes came from the chamber of death, and none can forget the seene. The stern old here, Jackson, wept over him, embracing and kissing him. Bres. Yerby told our Chaplain of this interview, and says she can never forget it. The good lady can never speak of him without leave in her own eyes.

It is superfluous to say that his brigade has met with a loss which cannot be replaced. CAPTURE OF THE BRITISH STEAMER PRINCESS CAPTURE OF THE BRITISH STRAMER PRINCESS
ROYAL.—The steam propeller Princess Royal, Capt.
Lawson, from Glassgow eia London, where she took
in cargo, St. Johns (N. F.), Halifax (N. S.) and Bermuda, having left the latter port on Friday, the 28d
instant, was captured at an early hour yesterday
morning off this port by the Yankee blockaders. She
was suddenly surrounded by a number of the fleet bewas suddenly surrounded by a number of the fleet before daylight, and the officers had to run her on the beach as the best resource left them. During yesterday the light draught Yankee steamers got a tow line to her, and succeeded in getting her off before high water. Captain Thomas Craig, the Charleston Pilot. Mr. Weston, a passenger, of Georgetown (S. C.), and two other persons, escaped from her in a boat and reached the city last evening. Valuable despatches, which were on board from Captain Maury, C. S. N., was in Europea to the Confidence of Government, have

now in Europe, to the Confederate Government, have been saved and brought to the city.

The Pincess Royal had on board a cargo of great value to us, consisting of machinery for gunboats, Whitworth guns, rifles, powder, and some workmen, who were to instruct parties here in reference to the manufacture of new projectiles. The bulk of her freight was about 900 tons weight and measurement. Captain Lawson was sick in the cabin at the time of the capture, and has had a terrible voyage, experiencing terrific gales in high northern lattitudes, and was compelled to put into St. Johns (N. F.), Halifax (N. S.), and Bermuda, to procure coal.

The steamer Cornubia, from Wilmington (N. C.), had arrived safely at Bermuda, and the steamer Mer-

rimac was still lying there.—Ch. Mercury 30th.

Carring of an Abourton Gunsoar.—The cheering, but not altogether unexpected, intelligence of the capture of a gunboat in Stono River, was received in the city yesterday evening shortly after seven o'clock. Rumors were in circulation that an attack upon the gunboats that have been cruising in Stono undisturbed, and maranding along its banks, would be made in pursuance of a plan conceived by the commanding officers of the post.
