On one day, last week, a Mr. Stroud, residing about twelve miles from this place, in the neighborhood of fouth Lowell, was struck on the head with a mallet by one of his servants, who professes to have done it accidentally, buf that, fearing his master would punish him severely, struck him again and again until he killed him. The murderer and two or three other negroes, believed to be accessories in the crime, were promptly arrested and lodged in fall in this town.

The other, and still more structions marder was committed on Tuesday last upon Mr. Lockhert, of this county, residing about fourteen miles of this place, on his farm. Mr. Lockhert was walking out in his field, when one of his negroes came up steathily be-HILLSBORO' Feb. 21, 1863.

on his farm. Mr. Lockhart was walking out in his field, when one of his negroes came up stealthily beddind him and gave him a blow upon his head with an asc, from the effects of which he felt. The negro left him but returned again after some time, and finding him still breathing gave him several more blows with his axe, thus completing his findish work. The murderer end several other negroes engaged in the affair, have been brought here and placed in confinement. One of these negroes confesses that every negro on the plantation was knowing to the fact that their master was to be murdered. From all I can learn of this case, there seems to have been no provocation whatever on the part of Mr. L., but on the contrary he has had the reputation of being a good man, and a kind and merciful master. I trust it will teach our people a lesson which they will not noon forget, or fall to improve. The murderers will be tried here in March. Yours, &c., CONFEDERATE.
