A spentleman who has recently visited several of the principal cities of the North has furnished us with an account of his trip and a journ among the Yankees. Leaving Bichmond two days before Christmas, he arrived in Maryland on Christmas over and was warmly received in that partion of the State where he landed, where the Southern sentiment is almost unanimous. Every facility was afforded him in making his way to Baltimore. He arrived in that city in the middle of the day on Sunday, and being well known there, found: it necessary to observe great can in in middle of the day on Sunday, and being well known there, found it necessary to observe great enution in his novements. He remained in lightmore one week, during which time he kept himself catefully secretal during the day, making his perambulations through the city after night by gas light. While he remained in the city he saw a number of its prominent business men, with whom he conversed freely. They all seemed hopeful of the result of the present struggle, and believe that Southers independence will be the inevitable consequence of the present revolution. There was no public expression of opinion, all parties appearing to be awed by and subdued on account of the presence and and an examinable arts of the military stationed in their midst. They expressed keep mortification at the present humiliated condition of their State, and great regret that the real sentiment of her people is not properly understood and her embarrassments appreciated. The usual lively sepret of affairs in the city at this senson of the year is painfully changed, and sadness and gleom hang over everything. Few ladies are to be seen on the street at any time.

From Baltimore our traveling friend made his way

to the city of New York. Here he remained for over a week and during that time circulated freely in all quarters, affording himself an opportunity of hearing expressions of opinion with reference to the present crisis from all classes of the population of the city. None of the restraint felt in Baltimore is experienced in New York, and those who oppose the Lincoln Ad-ministration talk with great freedom and act independently, without apparent apprehension of consequences. Of the war they declare themselves hearfily tired, and with its management completely discussed. He heard Lincoln and his apparters openly dehounced as traitors in the public houses in New York. In favor of an honorable adjustment of the present difficulties there is a very strong and rapidly growing scalingaring the South by the thinking portion of the community; but there is atill a linguing hope that the States of the Centeleracy may yet be induced to return to the Union. It is everywhere openly and boldly proclaimed that no more troops can be raised. boldly proclaimed that no more troops can be raised for the prosecution of the war under present auspices. The regro policy of the Republican Administration at Washington is riolently condemned, and the bone and sinew; of whom Northern soldiers are made, swear they will fight neither for nor with the negro. Gen. Lee is spoken of generally as the greatest mili-tary genius of the age and incomparably superior to any general upon the Federal side. Not only is he spoken of as a great commander, but as a polished gentleman, devoid of that bragadocio for which their officers are characteristic. "Stonewall? Jackson is greatly admired for his during and brilliant uchlevements, and others of our general officers are talked of in terms of warm commendation. The health of "Jeff Davis" is not unfrequently drank in the public bar rooms. During his soj urn in Gotham, our Wool and his staff were guests of the house at the same time. There were very few soldiers in the city, and not many on the route between New York and Butimore. All the places of amusement in the city were open nightly, and pretty generally througed. Business was not active, many of the merchants declaring their determination to retain their goods on the shelf in preference to disposing of them for "green backs." Yery few "green backs" are in circulation, the present currency being State bank money, and postage currency for small change. No specie is seen

Leaving New York the gentleman alluded to pro-ceeded to Boston, where he arrived in the midst of a heavy snow storm. Being on a sight-seeing expedi-tion he determined, however, not to be deterred by the inclement weather. Procuring a back he visited the inclement weather. Procuring a back he visited Charlestown, Cambridge, and the Bunker Hill Monument. He does not recollect to have heard a wor'l said about the war during his stay in Boston, and the people there seem scarcely conscious of the stupendous struggle that is in progress. There seemed to be a general spirit of gaiety, the Yaukees in that locality apparently feeling little of the pressure resulting from the troubles which are afflicting other and more descript agetions of the country. He some tired of the city, and left it in disgust, returning to New York by the "Stonlagton routs," where he remained several days longer,

From thence he came on to Philadelphia, and put up at the Girard House, intending to spend several days in that city. On the night of his arrival Senator Waff, of New Jersey, who was en route for Washington, addressed a large gathering of the people from the front balcony of the Girard House. Our friend says that no idea can be formed from the newspaper reports of the enthusiasm created by this speech. From beginning to ending it was received with tumultous applanes by the Philadelphians. After the speech was concluded, our traveller, in passing through the hall of the botel, met with a detective whom he hall formerly known in Baltimore, and by whom he was afraid of being recognized. This mexpected meeting of an old acquaintance—with whom he had no desire to hold an interview—determined him to make his sojourn in the Quaker city very brief, and as the cars were about departing southward, he at once engaged massage.

After more than a week of telloss journeying, over a route which we do not deem is entirely prudent to mention, he arrived safely is Richmond, much gratified with his trip, and firmly impressed with the belief, from all that he could see and hear that the first of July will witness the termination of the war.
