THE CURE OF LIVING.—If a man goes to market now, without a plinthic purse, expecting to purchase enough for a comfortable dinner, he is doomed to a grievous disappointment. Meats have come to be a luxury attainable only by those who have a full supply of currency; while fish, fowl and eggs are rarely seen upon any table. The food question is assuming a serious aspect, but no one has sagacity enough to suggest an available remedy. Boarding houses are closing, and we hear that the Spottswood will shortly disengage with the table d'hôte, and rent its rooms for nothing. It is next to an impossibility for a man, with an ordinary salary, to procure board for himself, and if he has a family, his case is truly pitiable. The truth is, Richmond is over-crowded; her population is too large for her dimensions, and until some thousands of small stock quarters elsewhere, all households take the chances of starving together. In old times, it used to be considered almost criminal in a newspaper to announce the appearance of a case of small-pox, lest it might scare people from coming to the city, but we verily believe that a journalist could not now do a greater favor to the resident population than to proclaim the existence of a personal epidemic. —Richmond Whig.

THE FIGHT IN THE VALLEY.—The Staunton Spectator furnishes a correct account of the recent successful attack in the Valley of Virginia. It appears that on Thursday last the enemy drove in our pickets near Woodstock, when Gen. Jones sent out two regiments of cavalry, which attacked the enemy and a running fight took place, the enemy fleeing and our cavalry pursuing. We pursued them as far as Newburn, within eight miles of Winchester, when Gen. Milroy sent out a large force, and our soldiers fell back. We captured one hundred and eighty-four prisoners, who were sent to Richmond on Monday morning. We lost two men killed and five wounded. The enemy had some 25 wounded. It is probable that the killed numbered eight or ten. It is reported that Gen. Milroy, with most of his force, has advanced as far as Strasburg. We may expect more interesting news from the Valley in a few days. —Rich. Whig, yesterday.

Seated to the left, in the front, is a sleeping, and supposed to be sleeping, with his fingers very suspiciously feeling his throat.

ALL MILITIA OFFICERS OF THIS STATE ARE hereby notified to prevent any distillation of alcoholic liquors from any grain whatever within the bounds of their commands, and if persons are found distilling in violation of the law they are to seize the stills, arrest the parties offending, and carry them to a magistrate to be bound over. It is further made their duty to search for any such stills wherever they have reasonable grounds for suspecting such distillation, or where information is given them of it. All agencies employed for the apprehension and confinement of deserters and their transportation to the command of their respective Commanders, shall be applicable to persons liable to duty as Conscripts who shall fail to repair to the place of rendezvous after the publication of this call.
