### HOW GAMBLERS ROBB THEIR VICTIMS.

The Cook gambling affair has led to some important disclosures "in the affairs of the sporting fraternity," but nothing as we have yet seen—heard of, equals in interest a discovery made in this city yesterday.  
Conkik, one of the most noted in this city, and the frequent visitor to this city, and occupied on Superior street. He had contracted with her, and yesterday an attachment was issued against the property in his rooms. Sheriff Lattin and Deputy Sheriff Whitney went to seize the attachment, and in the course of their search they discovered a large number of dice.  
The rooms occupied by Conkik on the third floor consists of a sitting room where the gambling was done, and a bedroom, and a parlor, and a room for the use of the gambler, and had a table near the window, and a draw-poker table in the center of the room, with chairs placed to each side of the table. The walls and ceiling of the room are papered with white paper of star pattern.  
Directly over the room are two small rooms, also occupied by Conkik, but not furnished. A portion of the floor has been removed in the room immediately over the gambling room, and a small hole bored through the ceiling of the room above to each of the tables. As the holes come directly through the star pattern in the paper, they are scarcely distinguishable from below. Each hole is so placed as to enable a person applying his eye to it, to look directly in the hand of the player seated in the chair before him.  
An ingenious telegraphic machine was discovered, communicating between these holes in the room above and the chair of the gambler in the room below. A wire, having a handle near the hole, passed along between the flooring of the room above and the ceiling of the room below to the corner of the gambling room and back to the hole in the bedroom and came down in the corner, being concealed by a strip of board nailed up and papered over. It then passed under the floor of the gambling room to the table, where a small piece of the flooring has been cut away close by the table leg, where the left foot of the gambler would be placed while playing. There it terminated in a spring and hammer, connected by the carpet.  
The method of working this invention for robbing by machinery seems to have been as follows: The victim to be operated upon finds two chairs drawn up to the table. In one of these the gambler sits himself at once, placing his foot over the telegraphic hammer. The victim is obliged to take the chair, which is placed in the proper position for playing. The gambler's accomplice in the room above stretches himself on a mattress, with his eye at the peep-hole—and one hand grasping the telegraphic handle. The hole is so placed that he can look directly down into the hand of the victim.  
According to an arranged code of signals by pulling the handle, when the hammer strikes the number of raps on the side of the gambler's boot or slipper, the sound being magnified by the carpet. Of course it is easy to see that the man who sits down to play with such a game as this, is robbed as surely and systematically as if he had been bound hand and foot and delivered over to a highwayman, and of the two robbers, the highwayman would be the more decent.

In obedience to General Orders, No. 52, Adjutant and Inspector General's Office, dated Nov. 3d, 1862, ALL white males in the tenth Congressional District, between the ages of eighteen and forty years, whether residents of any other portion of this State or of other States, in which the Conscription Law has not been suspended by authority of the President, are hereby required to report themselves at the above mentioned places for examination and final enrollment on the days fixed in the aforesaid notice of the Examining Board.  
This notice includes EVERY white male person within the ages specified. Those who have been heretofore examined and discharged either by State or Confederate Surgeons, those who have at any time been discharged from the army—those who have furnished substitutes—and any and all persons who may claim exemption on any ground whatever.  
No discharge, exemption or detail, from any source, will excuse from attendance, at the places and times hereinbefore appointed.  
All laws and regulations applicable to deserters, shall be applied to such Conscripts as fail to report to the place of rendezvous for enrollment, or shall desert after enrollment.  
All agencies employed for the apprehension and confinement of deserters and their transportation to the command of their respective Commanders, shall be applicable to persons liable to duty as Conscripts who shall fail to repair to the place of rendezvous after the publication of this call.
