Confederate Congress.

RICHMOND, April 17 .- In the Senate to-day the House bill passed to displace from Quartermasters and Commissary Departments, clerks liable to military duty, and to detail for clerical duties disabled soldiers. The House bill passed early in the session reposling certain clauses in the Exemption act was taken up and amended by substituting the clauses of the Senate Exemption bill relative to overseers on plantations. METTING IN CASWELL. - A meeting of the farmers of . Caswell was held at Yancayville on the 13th, at which Hen. Bedford Brown presided. The toll-owing preamble and resolutions were passed: .

Whereas, our beloved country is invived in deadly conflict with one of the first national powers of the earth. and our dearest relations and friends are row in the army raised for our defence, and upon the valor, fortitude and physical power of endurance of that arms, everything is legendent instrumentally for the establishment of our

treedom and independence. And whereas, in the good Providence of God, our gal lant arms has hitherto proved more than a match for the superior numbers of our foes, when brought into the actual shock of battle; but nevertheless we are now threatneed with a disaster far more dreadful than defeat in a pitched battle-more dreadful, indeed, than many such defeats, namely, a scarcity of provisions necessary for the

support of life in man and beast. And whereas, our patriotic Governor, and the honored President of the Confederate States, have each by procismation recommended the adoption by the people of a line of policy having for its object the discourt maneing of those who would make crops of tobacco or cotton for the take of pecuniary gain; to the neglect of the calls of parintism, humanity and religion. We, therefore, a rtion of the planters of Casweil, in public meeting call-

ed for that purpose, do hereby declare : 1st. Our cordial approval of the policy indicated in the two proclamations referred to above; and-

2d. That in our opinion it is the sacred duty of all good sitizens to forget, at this crisis, all other considerations than those which belong to the establishment of our independence, and the support and comfort of our army, and the families at home of our brave, devoted soldiers, and the poor and needs of every description.

2 34. That it is the duty of all to devote themselves with salt denving zeal to the production of breadstuffs of every sort, and to use their best land for this purpose. And to shose ands, we who are here now assembled do pledge ourseless to devote our farms to the production of food, mahing only such quantity of tobacco as cannot interfere materially with the fullest production of corn and other grain,

and vegetables of every sort; therefore-Reso ced. That we pledge ourselves not to plant and cultivate in the present year, more than 2,500 plants of tobacso to the efficient hand on the farin, and in ascertaining the. author of hands by which to govern ourselves in planting we will have reference to and be controlled by the lists recently returned to the Colonel of the regiment of our county, on the occasion of the first call made for slaves to

work on the fortifications in our State. Resolved. That we carnestly and respectfully request our fellow-citizens, not in this meeting, to acquiesce in the policy we have recommended.

A report was in circulation based upon the statement of a civilian from Fredericksburg. that a general advance was projected by the enemy, but that a large body of troops, whose term of service expire between the 1st and 15th of May, refered to obey orders, believing that it was the object of the commandera-chief to force them into a fight of desperation before the efficiency of the army should be impaired by emerconcles which would arise during that period.

Any seeds sent to mer house will be immediately taken to the camp. In this war much may be done towards feeding the troops at small expense, and will greatly add to their health, con-

When transportation of troops or freights by railroad is necessary, a Quartermaster or other authorized officer, shall make requisition for the same upon the superintendent or proper officer of the railroad, furnishing the

dispatch in transportation, military officers an prohibited

necessary evidence of transportation, and delivering the troops or freight to be transported. III. In the event that more freight is to be transported over any road than the road has the ability to carry promptly, the obser furnishing evidence of transportation will indicate to the railroad other what shall take precedence. In the absence of any special order as to what freight shall go first the rathroad officer shall be governed by any General order the Quartermaster General may issue

IV. Where troops or freight is to be moved out of the usual routine of a railroad, the officer having charge of such movement, will fix with the superintendent, or other officer of the road on which the movement is to be made the day and hour of departure, and when so fixed, the troops or freight mut be ready at the appointed time. V. In the event of any military necessity for an unusual movement at any particular point the commanding offi-

cer at such a post will communicate fully the character and extent of service, to the principal officer of the road or roads from which it is required, and ask the personasupervision of the proper railroad officers to the duty. VI. Quartermaster and Commissaries will exercise dis eretion in shipping freight not wanted for immediate use and that may be stored at safe and convenient points, ta-

king care not to block up roads and thereby impede trans-VII. When it is necessary to send a special messenger with freight, such messenger must travel with the freight placed in his charge, and his transportation shall be so specified on its face, in order to prevent him from travel-

ling in any other way. VIII. Eurolling officers will permit conscripts, enrolled while in the employment of railroads, to remain at their duties until Colonel William M. Wadley, A. A. G., decides as to who of them it is necessary should be detailed

for service on the road. IX. Any violation of these orders, or remissness on the part of railroad officers to perform promptly all Government transportation will be reported to Colonel William M. Wadley, A. A. G, who will indicate from time to time where his headquarters will be.

WHEREAS, IT HAS BECOME APPARENT TO ME and to all who are interest d in the well a of the State, and who have any feelings of humanity for suffer ing among their fellow-in n. f. om the cries which reach us from the poor in all sections of the land, that sta. vation will be the fate of many of our heretofore favored people, unless the crime of speculating in the necessares f life can be arrested; and whereas, it is my duty to protect the citizens of the State, of which I have the honor to be the Chief Magistrate, against the exil-Now, therefore, I, ZEBULON B. VANCE, Governor of North Carolina, do, by and with the advice and consent of the Council of State issue this Proclamation, forbidding all persons, for the space of thirty days from the. date hereof, from exporting any of the following articles beyond the limits of the State, to wit: any Salt, Bacon,

From this prohibition the following persons are to be exempted: All Quartermasters and Commissary Agents of the Confederate Government, and of any State of the Confederacy, exhibiting proper evidence of their official character. Also, all Agents of any County, District, Town or Corporation, of other States, who shall exhibit satisfactory proof of their Agency for the purchase of such articles for such County, District. Town or Corporation, for public uses, or for distribution at cost and transportation, and not for resale or profit. Also, all persons whether residents or non-residents of the State who may purchase any of said articles for their private use, of which, before the articles are removed, their oath, before a Justice of the Peace, may be taken as evidence. The exception is to extend to Salt no.
