Confederate Congress.

Richmond, April 17.—In the Senate to-day the House bill passed to displace from Quartermaster and Commissary Departments, clerks liable to military duty, and to detail for clerical duties disabled soldiers.

The House passed the Exemption bill reported Wednesday from the Committee of Conference. Also, passed a bill to allow hospital accommodations to sick and wounded soldiers at one dollar per day.

Meeting in Caswell.

What our beloved country is involved in deadly conflict with one of the first national powers of the earth, and our dearest relations and friends are now in the army.

And whereas, in the good Providence of God, our gallant arms have hitherto proved more than a match for the superior numbers of our foes, when brought into the actual shock of battle; but nevertheless we are now threatened with a disaster far more deplorable than defeat in a pitched battle—more deplorable, indeed, than many such defeats, namely, a scarcity of provisions necessary for the support of life in man and beast.

And whereas, our patriotic Government and the honored President of the Confederate States, have each by proclamation recommended the adoption by the people of a system of devoting our farms to the production of food, making those who would make crops of tobacco or cotton for the sake of pecuniary gain to the neglect of the calls of patriotism, humanity and religion. We, therefore, a portion of the planters of Caswell, in public meeting called for that purpose, do hereby declare:

1st. Our unconditional approval of a policy indicated in the above declaration, for its object is the preservation of life.

2d. That in our opinion it is the sacred duty of all good citizens to forget at this crisis, all other considerations than those which belong to the establishment of our independence, and the support and comfort of our army, and the families at home of our brave, devoted soldiers, and the present and future of our country.

3d. That it is the duty of all to devote themselves with self-denying zeal to the production of breadstuffs of every sort, and to use their best land for that purpose. And to those who are here, we have assembled to pledge ourselves to devote our farms to the production of food, making only such quantity of tobacco as cannot interfere materially with the fullest production of corn and other grain, and vegetables of every sort; therefore—

Resolved, That we pledge ourselves not to plant and cultivate in the present year, more than 2,500 plants of tobacco on the efficient hand on the farm, and in assisting the number of hands by which to govern ourselves, we will have reference to and be controlled by the lists recently returned to the Colonel of the regiment of our county, on the occasion of the first call made for slaves to work on the fortifications in our State.

Resolved, That we earnestly and respectfully request our fellow-citizens at this meeting, to acquiesce in the policy we have recommended.

FROM THE RAPPANNOCK.—The Examiner of Thursday says: Railway intelligence makes out the fight on the Rappahannock, on Tuesday, at Kelly's Ford, in which the enemy was repulsed after five successive attempts to cross, with some loss, extent not known, but slight on the Confederate side.

On the same day a demonstration was made near Germania and U. S. Ford, but no engagement is reported. It was believed that Hoke had made a general advance, but all remaining quiet on yesterday, the impression abated. A report was in circulation based upon the statement of a civilian from Fredericksburg, that a general advance was projected by the enemy, but that a large body of troops, whose term of service expires before the 1st and 15th of May, refused to obey orders, believing that it was the object of the commander-in-chief to force them into a fight of desperation before the efficiency of the army should be impaired by emergencies which would arise during that period.

Any seeds sent to my house will be immediately taken to the camp. In this way much may be done towards feeding the troops at small expense, and will greatly aid to their health, contentment and happiness. Quartermaster's Department. RALEIGH, N. C., April 13, 1863. THE FOLLOWING ORDERS ARE PUBLISHED for the information and guidance of all concerned: Recognizing the necessity of officers of railroads having full control of their business in order to ensure safety and dispatch in transportation, military officers are prohibited from interfering with the engines, cars, running of trains, or with the control and management in any way of railroads.

When transportation of troops or freights by railroad is necessary, a Quartermaster or other authorized officer, shall make requisition for the same upon the superintendent or proper officer of the railroad, furnishing the necessary evidence of transportation, and delivering the tickets of freight to be transported, and delivering the tickets of freight to be transported, and delivering the tickets of freight to be transported.

In the event that more freight is to be transported over any road than that road has the ability to carry promptly, the officer furnishing evidence of transportation will indicate to the railroad officer what shall take precedence. In the absence of any special order as to what freight shall go first the railroad officer shall be governed by any General order the Quartermaster General may issue in regard thereto.

Where troops or freight is to be moved out of the usual routine of a railroad, the officer having charge of such movement, will fix with the superintendent, or other officer of the road on which the movement is to be made the day and hour of departure, and when so fixed, the troops or freight must be ready at the appointed time.

In the event of any military necessity for an unusual movement at any particular point the commanding officer at such a post will communicate fully the character and extent of service, to the principal officer of the road or roads from which it is required, and ask the personal supervision of the proper railroad officers to the duty.

Quartermaster and Commissaries will exercise discretion in shipping freight not wanted for immediate use, and that may be stored at safe and convenient points, taking care not to block up roads and thereby impede transportation.

When it is necessary to send a special messenger with freight, such messenger must travel with the freight placed in his charge, and his transportation shall be so specified on his ticket, in order to prevent him from traveling in any other way.

Enrolling officers will permit conscripts, enrolled while in the employment of railroads, to remain at their duties until Colonel William M. Wadley, A. G., decides as to who of them it is necessary should be detailed for service on the road.

Any violation of these orders, or remissness on the part of railroad officers to perform promptly all Government transportation will be reported to Colonel William M. Wadley, A. G., who will indicate from time to time where his headquarters will be.

BY THE GOVERNOR OF NORTH CAROLINA. A PROCLAMATION. WHEREAS, IT HAS BECOME APPARENT TO ME and to all who are interested in the welfare of the State, and who have any feelings of humanity to suffer among their fellow-men from the crises which reach us from the poor in all sections of the land, that it is a duty to the State, and to the welfare of the people, to issue this Proclamation, forbidding all persons, for the space of thirty days from the date hereof, from exporting any of the following articles beyond the limits of the State, to wit: any Salt, Bacon, Pork, Beef, Corn, Meal, Flour, Wheat, Potatoes, Shoes, Leather, Hides, Cotton Cloth, and Yarn, and Woolen Cloth.

From this prohibition the following persons are to be exempted: All Quartermasters and Commissary Agents of the Confederate Government, and of any State of the Confederacy, exhibiting proper evidence of their official character. Also, all Agents of any County, District, Town or Corporation, of other States, who shall exhibit satisfactory proof of their Agency for the purchase of such articles for such County, District, Town or Corporation, for public uses, or for distribution at cost and transportation, and not for resale or profit. Also, all persons whether residents or non-residents of the State who may purchase any of said articles for their private use, or for the use of their families, and who are removed, their oaths before a Justice of the Peace, may be taken as evidence. The exception is to extend to Salt meat, non-residents on the sea coast and in their own boats and cargoes entering a port of this State.

Any of said articles that may be stopped by a frontier border are to be confiscated to the State. The Colonels of Militia throughout the State are enjoined to see that this Proclamation is enforced. I earnestly appeal to all good citizens to sustain and aid me in carrying out the object this Proclamation is designed, as far as possible, to effect.

In witness whereof, ZEBULON B. VANCE, Governor of North Carolina, do, by and with the advice and consent of the Council of State, issue this Proclamation, forbidding all persons, for the space of thirty days from the date hereof, from exporting any of the following articles beyond the limits of the State, to wit: any Salt, Bacon, Pork, Beef, Corn, Meal, Flour, Wheat, Potatoes, Shoes, Leather, Hides, Cotton Cloth, and Yarn, and Woolen Cloth.

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From this prohibition the following persons are to be exempted: All Quartermasters and Commissary Agents of the Confederate Government, and of any State of the Confederacy, exhibiting proper evidence of their official character. Also, all Agents of any County, District, Town or Corporation, of other States, who shall exhibit satisfactory proof of their Agency for the purchase of such articles for such County, District, Town or Corporation, for public uses, or for distribution at cost and transportation, and not for resale or profit.
