SUFFOLK.
The Examiner, of Finley, gives the following relative to the "situation" at Suffolk from an intelligent gentleman from there on Tuesday night last:

At that time our pickets were in sight of Suffeck and crust inft skirmishing was going on between the two armies. The enemy was shelling the woods all through the day, but could get no response from our batteries. Our forces had seized and held the Nor-, folk and Petersburg railroad, within some two or three miles of Suffolk, and a formidable detachment of our army was marching on the Rosnoke and Seaboad railroad, at the time our informant left, and probably by this time have also taken possession of this line. These railroads intersed from Suffelk, and if they are held by our forces, as they probably are by this time, it cuts off the enemy accommunication with Portsmouth and Norfolk. The only communication left the enemy and Nerfolk. The only communication left the enemy will be up the Nanaemoud river, and this has been so obstructed as to prevent the passage up of the gupboats. It is hoped that with these obstructions, supported by our field artillery, the enemy's gunboats may be held in check, and the ener y thus cut off from all his lines of communication. On Tuesday a long and terrific cause nading is reported to have taken place, lasting so day, between several of our batteries and the enery's gamboats, resulting in the sinking of one guntout and the disabling of two more. Our forces had thrown a pontoon bridge-over the river, and other steps had been taken to for tify against the enemy getting up the river with houndboats. The Yankee force at Suffolk is estimated to be about 20,000 strong, and consists mainly of new troops. The garrison i ander command of General Keyes. If our forces re in the rear of the enemy and communication car off, as represented, it will be impossible for them to get any reinforcements from Norfolk and Fortsess Monroe, and the result may be the capitulation of the whole Yankee force at Suffolk. Lecleed, we are told that the enemy has so few troops at both points that, even if communication were unobstructed, no troops could be spared to be sent to suffolk. The enemy has considered himself safe in that section, and is not at all prepared for the emergency of throwing reinforcements from point to point,

The Enquirer of the same date has the following :

We learn from a party who arrived from the vicinity of Suffolk, on Yesterday, that on Tuesday last a hot engagement took place between several guabouts on the Nansemond and our batteries on the shore, realting in the defeat of the former; and also that Gen. Longstreet was now certainly in the re r of the eveny a Suffolk, baving command of the "situation" and proceeding to force a surrender. Our informant have yankees in that region, learned from them the folwing: It was reported, and credited, that Gen. Wise had captured Fort Magruder, below Williamsl arg, with about one thousand prisoners, and that the commanding General at Fortress Monroe (Dix.) toring an assault upon Hampton, had posted sixty pickets at Hampton Bridge, and prepared the structure with combustibles to be destroyed at a moment's notice. 11. When transportation of troops or freights by railroad is necessary, a Quartermaster or other authorized officer, shall make requisition for the same upon the superintendent or proper officer of the railroad, furnishing the necessary evidence of transportation, and delivering the leaves of freight to be transported.

intendent or proper officer of the railroad, furnishing the necessary evidence of transportation, and delivering the troops or freight to be transported.

III. In the event that more freight is to be transported over any road than the road has the ability to carry promptly, the officer furnishing evidence of transportation will indicate to the railroad officer what shall take precedence. In the absence of any special order as to what freight shall go first the railroad officer shall be governed by any General order the Quartermaster General may issue in regard thereto.

IV. Where troops or freight is to be moved out of the assal routine of a railroad, the officer having charge of such movement, will fix with the superintendent, or other officer of the road on which the movement is to be made the day and hour of departure, and when so fixed, the troops or freight must be ready at the appointed time.

V. In the event of any military necessity for an unusual movement at any particular point the commanding officer at such a post will communicate fully the character and extent of service, to the principal officer of the road or roads from which if is required, and ask the personasupervision of the proper railroad officers to the duty.

VI. Quartermaster and Commissaries will exercise discretion in shipping freight not wanted for immediate use and that may be stored at safe and convenient points, taking care not to block up roads and thereby impede transportation.

VII. When it is necessary to send a special messenger with the freight.

VII. When it is necessary to send a special messenge with freight, such messenger must travel with the freight placed in his charge, and his transportation shall be so specified on its face, in order to prevent him from travel-

ling in any other way.

VIII. Enrolling officers will permit conscripts, envolled while in the employment of railroads, to remain at their duties until Colonel William M. Wadley, A. A. G., decides as to who of them it is necessary should be detailed

for service on the road.

1X. Any violation of these orders, or remissuess on the part of railroad officers to perform promptly all Government transportation will be reported to Colonel William M. Wadley, A. A. G., who will indicate from time to time where his headquarters will be.
