

No. 6 THE FOLLOWING EXTRACT FRO 1 THE ACT amendatory of the exemption Act, passed by the late Congress of the Confederate States is published for the information and guidance of those whom it may concern. (EXTRACT.) h

SEC. 4. "In addition to the State officers exempted by the Act of Oct. 11, 1862, there shall be exempted all State officers whom the Governor of any State may claim to have exempted for the due administration of the Government and laws thereof but this exemption shall not continue in any State after the adjournment of the next regwlar session of its Legislature, unless such Legislature shall, by law exempt, them from military duty in the Provisional Army of the Confederate States."
