HARRISBURG, June 18 .- There is a Confederate force North of Greencastle and six Regiments of mounted infantry encamped at Williamsport, North of the Potomac; four regiments at Hagerstown; Mosby's cavalry eight miles below Chambersburg, and a portion of the Confederate cavalry at McConnellsburg, going to Hancock. The Confederates are paroling all citizens. Fresh troops arriving at Harrisburg not so rapidly as the State autorities wish.
