A Cincinnati telegram dated the 22d, says yesterday pine bundred rebels crossed into Indiana, near Leavenworth, and had reached Panola. The purpose of the raid is said to burn bridges on the Ohio & Mississippi railroad. The Propost Mar-hal of Baltimore has prohibited city papers copying any extracts from the World, Express,

The wires refused to work last night either way, and we failed to get our usual dispatches from Richmond. All will be right, we suppose, to-day.

A number of persons have come out of Newbern and Beaufort within the last few days, and negro soldiers have made their appearance as far out as Swift creek. They were said to be well armed and equipped.

THE DEFENSES OF VICKSBURG.—Speaking of the strength of the fortifications around Vicksburg, the correspondent of the Chicago Tribune says: After a careful reconnoissance of the rebel works,

ne of our Generals assured me that he would prefer to storm Vicksburg from the river. Nothing could be more claborate than the defences upon the East. to the north of the city, where it was expected that bey would be most strongly entrenched, we found the rebels on the morning after our arrival busy as beavers constructing a line of carthworks. After a heavy cannonade by Langroven's battery and others, they were dislodged, and Gen. Steele was enabled to advance a half mile or so nearer. Opposite McClernard the rebels have hardly turned a spadeful of earth except to repair, during the night, breaches made by our 30-pounder l'arrots during the day.

The line of fortifications is constructed after the most approved system of military engineering. It describes a zig-zag course—to illustrate by a rude figure, like that of a worm fence. The sides of the retreating angle are simply strong rifle-pits, but they completely enfillade each other, besides affording a flanking fire from the heavy guns which man the fortifications. These bastions stud the apex of every salient angle, which is naturally the weak point and are of the most formidable description. One in partigular of great size, and opposite McPherson, which, I understand is called Fort Vicksburg, is in places apparently from fifteen to twenty feet high, and nearly perpendicular. The cannon which man them are of heavy calibre, but not as numerous as the river batteries. The great guns which poured their death storm into our scudding flotilla of transports, such as the far-famed "Whilstling Dick," et id omne genus, are not so mounted as to be moved, and are most of them still in their old position. And it is well known that of not far from binety field pieces, composing pretty much all their available artiliery, which Pemberton moved out to confront us inland, seventy-four

Still several new guns have been mounted and opened fire on us since the siege began, but not in numbers sufficient to render them exceedingly formidable. The great strength of their redoubts lies in their internal construction. The Forlorn Hope of the 22d ascertained, to their cost, that after running the gauntlet of murderous volleys from the rifle pits, and actually scaling the rebel earthworks, they were still a long way from victory. Instead of being masters of an apparently deserted fort, they found themselves exposed to a fire from rifle pits, which, running from front to rear, pour in a cross fire upon troops entering by the corner of the redoubt, and after dislodging the enemy from the whole interior, they were shot down from an ambuscade behind another line of rifle pits,

which, instead af the usual curtain, forms the rear of the fort. More than one of these entrenched works were actually scaled, but the interior, so far from being an asylum for the assailants, proved to be a chamber, to which the open ground outside, swept as it were by constant volleys was preferable.

THE BROOKLY DEMOCRACY .- A mass meeting of the Brooklyn Democracy was held in that city on the 11th inst. The Mayor, Martin Kalbfleisch, presided. He delivered a speech, in which he scored Lincoln for violating the Constitution. The report of the speech is interspersed with the parenthetical phrases: "Applause," "Bully for you," "Groans for Lincoln," etc. We copy the following:

The Democratic party has no sympathy with Secessionists, (faint applause.) Nor have they with Abotionist. (Great applause.) They are in favor of the Union. (A man in the audience here called for three cheers for "Valligoron," which most of the audience, including the speaker, mistook for "Niggerdom," which caused considerable disturbance, some cheering some hissing, and not a few crying "put him out.")-The speaker resumed: If the gentleman has anything to say let him say it in a mannerly way. (Applause.) If the gentleman had rather embrace a nigger baby than a white one, let him say so. (Tremendous applause.) (A gentleman on the stage here arose, and suggested to the speaker that the audience had mistaken the man who called for cheers for "Valligordon;" that he meant Vallandigham, and he proposed that the audience now give their cheers for that individual. The cheers given, and quiet was again restored.) The Mayor then resumed his remarks, and said that the war in which we were now engaged should be brought to an issue; it should be terminated. If the war was for restoring the Union, the Government would have the support of every Democrat in the country, and he hoped the party now administering the Government would become convinced of the necessity of presenting an unbroken front to the enemy. Let them show to the country that the war was waged to restore the Union, and it and one of the leading founders of the city of Galveston. would not be long before the Stars and Strips would again wave over every inch of territory in the coun-

try. (Prolonged applause.) A series of resolutions were adopted, the last one of

Resolved, That we renew our declaration of attachment to the Union, pledging to its friends, wherever found, our unwavering support, and to its enemies, in whatever guise, our undying hostility, and that, God willing, we will stand by the Constitution and laws of our country, and under their sacred shield will maintain and defend our liberty and rights, "peaceably, if we can, forcibly, if we must."
