The Fall of Vicksburg Confirmed. Jackson, July 7 .- Vicksburg has fallen. It was sur-

tendered on the morning of tht 4th, the men being in a starving condition and completely worn out by excessive fatigue. The terms of capitulation were that the officers be allowed to retain their side arms, horses, and all private property-they and the men to be parolled immediately and allowed to march out with colors. Immediateafter the surrender Grant sent a boat load of supplies to the famished garrison. Some of the officers have artived here.

SECOND DISPATCH. The Fall of Vicksburg--Citizens leaving Jackson.

Jackson, July 7 .- There is but little more known of the fall of Vicksburg. Officers say that had Gen, Johnston reached there twelve days sooner he could not have relieved the garrison, as they could not muster over seven thousand men for duty. Many citizens are leaving here with their families, negroes and stock. Mississippitte office packing up to leave.

Additional from Mississippi.

JACKSON, July S .- Every thing is in the wildest state of excitement here; citizens are flying in every direction. The streets are filled with stock, negroes and families in ox-carts and every species of conveyance. Terrible storm last night and very heavy rains. Citizens beyond Clinton reports the enemy burning every dwelling they pass. A fight is hourly looked for.

----Col. P. G. Evans.—This chivalrous and gallant officer, we regret to learn, was dangerously wounded in the battle at Middleburg, and is now a prisoner inthe hands of the enemy.
