THIRD DISPATCHALL JACKSON, July 10. An attack has begun. Our batte-

ries opened on them finely. The enemy are evidently in TOTALE DISPATCH. Jackson, July 10. - Heavy skirmishing continues at Cliaton. The enemy are slowly making around our left, The attack may not become general before morning,

though the enemy's troops are still pressing forward .-But few men lost on our side yet. The enemy must be suffering for water as all disterns and ponds have been destrayed. Thermometer 92. FIFTH PUSPATOR.

Asckson, July 10 .- There is heavy infantry and artillery skirmishing going on. The enemy in chelling the city killed several soldiers and citizens. No general enragement vet. Our troops are in excellent spirits, and if the enemy make a general attack we will whip them cer tain. Every man is at his post.

[SIXTH DISPATER.] Jackson, July 10 .- Artillery fire ceased. The enemy's sharpshooters and our skirmishers are blazing away. Our in-today will not exceed fifty.

Casualties of the Gettysburg Battle, &c.

Righton July 12 .- A correspondent of the Richmond When writing from Winchester on the 8th says, that in Gen Joe Davis' Brigade every field officer was wounded. Gen. Hood was wounded in the arm by the fragment of a shell, but the arm will be saved. Gen. Trimble lost the leg wounded in a previous battle. The following embraces a partial list of casualties: Col. V. D. Groner, 61st Va.: Adjt. Campell, 4sth-Miss.: Col. Miller, 42nd Miss.; Lt. Col. Smith, 55th N. C.; Col. Edmondson, 38th Va.; Col. DeSaussure, S. C., and Col. Jones, 20th Ga., are reported killed. Col. Thomas, 8th Ga., wounded; Col. Jack Brown, 59th Ga., shot through both legs; Col. Kennedy, S. C.; Lt. Col. Whittle, 38th Va.; Col. Thomas Griffin, 18th Miss.; Col. Holder, 17th Miss.; Col. McEllroy, 13th Miss, and Col. Garritt, 19th Va., are reported wounded. Lt. Col. Fleagan, 15th Ala.; leg amputated. Col. Lightfoot and Maj. Culver, 6th Ala., and Col. Humphrey and Maj. Blair, 2nd Miss., are reported missing. The writer says the disadvantage of our position at Gettysburg may be understood by saying that it was decidedly worse than the position of the hostile forces at the first battle of Fredericksburg, reversed. Our loss has dwindled down astonishingly from the first reports. Most of the wounds are in the hand, arm and leg. It is reported that Meade's army is concentrating near Washington.

The Yankees Repulsed at Charleston.

CHARLESTON, July 10 .-- Firing on both sides ceased at half past six o'clock. The principal fighting has been with battery Wagner, on Morris Island. Four Moniters were engaged from five to two. Tug boats supplied them with ammunition and they renewed the attack at three. The infantry fighting was also severe. The Yankees made two assaults on battery Wagner and were repulsed. Our casualties are about one hundred and fifty, killed wounded and missing, including three officers killed-Capt. Yaskell, Cheves and Lieut. Ben. It is supposed the attack will be renewed to-morrow.

Stephen's Mission to Fortress Monroe.

RICHMOND, July 11. - Correspondence explanatory of Stephens' mission shows that he went to Fortress Monroe as Military Commissioner, to obtain from the Federal authorities an agreement to conduct the war hereafter according to the usages of civilized nations. After waiting two days. Stephens was informed that the proposition for a conference was inadmissable: he therefore returned to this city,

No news this morning.

Another on to Richmond

RICHMOND, July 12.—We have reports this morning of another "on to Richmond" by way of James river. Two Monitors, three wooden gunboats, and several Transports, with about five thousand troops, are said to have passed Sandy Point yesterday. No other news.

Orleans correspondent of the N. Y. Herald writes, June 26, as follows:

I am sorry I am so circumstanced, in consequence of our having been cut off from communication with Brashier City, that I am not able to give you the full particulars of the capture of that important place by the rebels. From refugees who arrived in camp today, I learn the following details: . On Tuesday last, at four o'clock, a. m., not unexpectedly as was stated, a small force of rebels made their appearance at Berwick City, immediately opposite Brashear City, and opened fire on our encampment at that place from two small pieces of artillery. The attention of our gunners at Fort Buchanan was drawn to them, and after a few shots they were apparently dispersed.-This, it appears, was a ruse on the part of the enemy for searcely had our soldiers been placed in position to resist an advance of the rebels from that place when they were suddenly suprised by a large force of the enemy, which had, during the night, crossed Lake Palourde, and come up in their rear. The rebels entered the town, and our men surrendered, I am very credibly informed, without making any very determined resistance. Our loss on this occasion was nearly 1,000 men, including a camp of about 600 convalescent soldiers. But this was not the worst part of the business. The rebels, by the capture of our force, gained possession of Fort Buchanan and Fort Shene, and another smaller earthworth further down the bay. On these fortifications were mounted eighteen or twenty guns of heavy calibre, several of which were there finest rifle pieces we had in this de-

> Some of the pieces we lost were those recently taken from Camp Parapet, others raised from the steamer Hinsman, that sank in the bay last March. Altogether this is one of the severest blows the rebels have dealt us in this part of the country. In military circles Brashear City is considered a place of great importance. The fortifications at this place command Berwick Bay, the Atchafalaya, and in fact all navigation from the Gulf to the Attakapas country. The rebel force we encountered was under the command of Magruder, and is variously estimated at from ten to fifteen thousand. The rebels in taking Brashear City captured quite an amount of quartermaster's and commissary stores, as well as considerable ammunition. The enemy also came in possession of the personal baggage of many of our officers and men who had left Brashear City on their repid approach to Onelousas, Alexardria and Port Hudson.
