RICHMOND, July 13 .- Northern-dates to the 41th rerived here. Orders have been issued for three hundred housand conscripts. The laws will be enforced. Remnoso, July 14.4 Baltimore American of Saturday evening received here. #### From Mississippi--Fighting going on at Jack-

Jucason, July 11. - Another day has passed without an engagement. In the morning the enemy threw a force en our right threatening a flank movement. Generals teatherston and Buford reinforced him. We drove the enemy back after an hours' hard fighting. Gen. Buford 1621 sixty men principally of the Seventh and Eighth Kenbicky. The enemy then withdrew from our right and in the afternoon made another demonstration on our lets centre. Van Amburg's Brigade repulsed them after a hard fight. Our loss to-day about two hundred. The enemy are still fortifying.

SECOND DISPATCH.

JACKSON, July 11, 11 o'clock p. m .- The enemy are still concentrating on our right to reach Pearl river. Our forces have just driven them back in the centre and burned houses occupied by their sharpshooters.

#### Later From Jackson.

Jackson July 12. - Enemy opened fire at six o'clock this morning from his batteries on our left, and at 8 o'clock, a. m., rained shells on the city. The enemy made a charge, but the Washington Artillery and Cobb's Battery repulsed them with heavy loss, capturing 300 prisoners and three stand of colors. Adams' and Stovall's brigades acted gallantly. The enemy are now moving around our right. Scouts report that Burnside is crossng Birdsong Ferry with two divisions. Col. Withers, an old citizen, was killed by a shell.

IN COMPLIANCE WITH AN ACT OF THE REcent Legislature, Commanding Officers of the Militia are ordered to enroll as a Guard for Home Defence all white male persons not already enrolled in the service of the Confederate States, between the ages of 18 and 50 years, including foreigners not naturalized who have been residents of the State for thirty days before said en-

II. There shall be exempt from the operations of this order the Governor, the Judges of the St preme and Superior Courts of Law and Equity, Members of the General Assembly, the Officers of the several Departments of the Government, Members of Congress, Civil and Military Officers of the Confederate Government in the State. the Ministers of the Gospel of the several Religious Denominations of the State, charged with the duties of such ministry, the high Sheriff and Clerks of the several Courts of Record, and the Public Registers in the several

III. After enrollment the men enrolled shall be divided into Companies of not less than seventy-five men, nor more than one hundred, and shall proceed to elect their Company Officers. The certificates of such election will be forwarded to this Office with the papers of enrollment, in order that Commissions may be issued. IV. Officers of the Militia will be enrolled for Home DEFENCE, and their Commissions, when called into service will be suspended only during the period of such

V. This order is not intended to interfere with the enrollment for immediate service, those between the ages of 40 and 45 years under Order No 13.

(.F. ORDER, ) COMMANDING OFFICERS OF THE MILITIA are ordered to enroll all able-bodied white men beween the ages of forty and forty-five years, who are subjest to the Conscript Act. Those who are exempt from military duty by the Exemption Acts of Congress, are not

to be enrolled under this order. II. In addition to the exemptions under said act, heretofore published, are the following exempted under act of the Congress and approved April 30th, 1863: - Justices of the Peace, County Trustees, County Solicitors, Coroners, Registers, Tax Collectors, one Deputy Sheriff in each County where there is no Tax Collector, Constables now in office, one Deputy Clerk for each Court when the Court may request it, one County Commissioner for each County for distributing money and provisions among soldiers' families, Agents appointed under act of Legislature for any public duty, Militia Officers, Mayor and Police of Raleigh, Wilmington, Fayetteville, Salisbury and Charlotte, Counsellors of State, Board of Internal Improvements, Literary Board, and Employees of the State Government in the different departments.

III. The Commanding Officers of the Militia will report with the men ordered to be enrolled, at Raleigh, on or before the 1st of August. IV. Each man ordered above will bring with him to
